Regents Approve **Increased Budget**

The University's Board of Regents Saturday approved an increase of \$41,460 in the budget for the coming fiscal year, beginning July 1. The new budget totals \$11,684,159.

Chancellor Clifford Hardin listed minor salary adjustments caused by promotions throughout all colleges and increased summer session budget (up \$22,-987) caused by heavier enrolly ments as the reasons for the increase.
