For example, if a student is scheduled for a regular examination which conflicts with a French unit examination, arrangements should be made with the Romance Languages department to take such unit examination at another time.

at 8 a.m. with students who have 50 or more hours on record. Those with 45 hours may register at 9 a.m., and those with 40 hours at 10 a.m. Starting at 1 p.m., students with 35 hours may register; at 2 p.m., those with 30 hours, and at 3 p.m. those with 20 hours.

On May 23, registration will begin at 8 a.m. with students with 17 hours; students with 15 hours at 9 a.m.; and with 13 hours at 10 a.m. At 1 p.m., all students may register, regardless of hours.

The number of credit hours at which students may register will be posted on blackboards before the Military and Naval Science Building, at the Regents Bookstore and the Activities Building on Ag campus.

A student may not schedule more than three-fifths of his classes on Monday, Wednesday or Friday mornings. Every student's schedule will be checked to see that this is observed.

To take care of anticipated enrollments with present facilities in rooms and instructors, classes must be scheduled for all hours from 8 to 5, five days a week.

The three-fifths rule forces a somewhat equitable distribution of students at all hours on all days, so that the students registering first do not take all available spaces in classes at popular hours on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings.

University Receives Experimental Research Grant

The University received a \$12,100 grant from the Fund for the Advancement of Education for an experimental study of better utilization of teaching resources with the coming increases in enrollment.

The money will be used for a study to compare effectiveness and per pupil cost of small class sections in the principles of economics conducted by teachers of carrying abilities with large classes conducted by an outstanding teaching staff member and graduate assistants.

The grant is part of a \$501,615 total given to 34 institutions of higher learning in the United States.

The University experiment to be conducted next year will be directed by Dr. Edward Schmidt, chairman of the department of economics.




