New Council Members Give Opinions On Issues

In an effort to present to the student body the opinions of the newly elected council members on certain campus issues, the Nebraska conducted an interview with five winners of the recent Student Council election.

Members interviewed were: Monroe Usher, Phi Gamma Delta from Arts and Sciences; Bob Schuyler, Phi Gamma Delta from Business Administration; Anne Pickett, Kappa Alpha Theta from Arts and Sciences; Connie Berry, Pi Beta Phi from CCRC; and Dick Andrews, Alpha Tau Omega from Interfraternity Council.

All of the members interviewed openly supported the idea of having a student tribunal at the University.

Usher commented, "I would be very happy to see a student tribunal initiated at the University."

The newly elected Business Administration member, Bob Schuyler, when commenting on the possibilities of a tribunal, emphasized the need for "proper co-ordination between the administration and the student body."

Schuyler added that "this system can do much to elevate university standards and general student feeling."

Connie Berry called the proposed tribunal "a very good idea." She thought, however, that "careful study should go into such a plan."

IFC's representative, Dick Andrews, believed that "records in other midwest colleges have been significant enough that such a tribunal should be given further consideration."

Miss Pickett stated that she would work for the realization of a student tribunal. She went on to say that "an honor system also is not out of the question. It is up to the Student Council to provide the organizing force in implementing these plans."

In lieu of the fact that only 20 per cent of the student body voted in the recent Council election all members interviewed were asked whether they considered the vote to be a valid cross-section of campus opinion.

Usher thought that "everyone who was interested in campus affairs voted."

"Lack of vital issues," was cited by Schuyler, as the possible reason for the poor turnout.

Andrews stated that the "vote indicated student apathy toward the Council and the tribunal."

Miss Berry and Miss Pickett had no opinion on the light vote which was cast.

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
