# Residence Halls Glee Clubs To Present Joint Concert

The first annual joint concert of the Residence Association for Men Glee Club and the Women's Residence Halls Glee Club will be held Wednesday night, according to Lyle Hansen, RAM president.

Hansen said the performance will be held in the recreation room of Selleck Quadrangle at 8 p.m. No admission will be charged.

A program of classical numbers, novelty tunes and spirituals has been planned by the two groups, he added.

The RAM group, under the direction of Dick Oehring, has appeared

several times this year, including a guest appearance at Ivy Day. Other engagements include an appearance at a veterans' hospital, the RAM installation banquet and a fall concert. Wednesday at 11 a.m. the group will appear on a local television station.

The women's group will sing "Religion is a Fortune," the number which won second place for the group in the Ivy Day competitive singing.

Each club will present a program of its own, then the groups will combine for the final three numbers.

The men's portion of the program includes such favorites as Romberg's "Stouthearted Men," "Cool Water" and "Birmingham Jail."

"My Task" and "The Unconstant Lover" are included in the women's selections.

"We are very happy to be able to have this combined concert, especially since both our clubs are relatively new," Oehring said. "Each group was organized during the current school year and both have shown amazing progress," he added.

# Peterson, Beggin Honored

Alan Petersen and John Beggin, seniors in the department of architecture, were named first-place winners in the "Parade of Homes" competition.

Both homes, three-bedroom, split-level types, will be constructed by the Home Builders Association of Lincoln for display during National Home Week, Sept. 15-23.

The association sponsored the contest in conjunction with the University department of Architecture.

Peterson won first place in the \$20-\$25,000 competition and Beggin, in the \$10-\$15,000 price bracket. Both students received \$100 checks.

Earlier this month, Beggin was honored as the best graduating student, receiving the American Institute of Architects Medal. Last year, he won second place in the Lincoln "Parade of Homes" competition and in 1954, third place in the Indiana Limestone apartment house competition. He has served as vice president of the student AIA chapter.

This month, Petersen received the Alpha Rho Chi medal for leadership, service to the school and promise of professional merit. He is president of American Institute of Architects. He won honorable mention in the Indiana Limestone Competition in 1954.

Other winners in the \$20-\$25,000 competition were: Jim Haberman, second, \$100 prize; Jerry Spencer, third, \$50; and Ray Stoneman, fourth, \$50.

All eight house-drawings will be entered in national competition sponsored by the magazine "Living for Young Homemakers."
