Talk Planned By Educator For Monday

Roger Albright, director of the Department of Educational Services of the Motion Picture Association, will be visiting the University next week.

Monday noon he will speak to a Phi Delta Kappa luncheon at the Union on "What Teaching Materials School Be Available in a Good School."

Albright has been director of the Department of Educational Services since 1946 when it was organized to co-ordinate and administer the various educational projects relating to the program of the Motion Picture Association.

Currently, his department is sharing in the support of a field consultation program administered by the Department of Audio-Visual Instruction of the National Education, and a similar program sponsored by the Conference of Presidents of Negro Land Grant Colleges through which experienced consultants are helping to re-organize and improve the audio-visual programs in the Negro colleges which are largely responsible for the training of Negro teachers.

Cocking will discuss "The Board of Education's Responsibility for Improvement of the Educational Program" at the Thursday morning session and will report on the recent White House Conference at the afternoon meeting.

Cocking also will address other University classes and seminars during the coming week.

Before assuming the editorship of the School Executive in 1943, he served as dean of the College of Education of the University of Georgia. From 1933 to 1937 he was Tennessee state commissioner of education.

He was president of the Joint Council on Economic Education from 1951 to 1954 and president

of the New York State Citizens Committee for the Public Schools from 1952 to 1954.

During 1941 and 1942 he was executive director of the planning committee of the Federal Security Agency and was chief specialist in school administration for President Roosevelt's advisory committee on education in 1937. He was consultant to the Tennessee Valley Authority from 1934 to 1946 and a member of the science advisory committee of the National Resources Planning Board from 1934 to 1939.

Roberts spoke on "The Role of Education in American Society: School-Community Relationships," and "The Broadening Concept of the Role of the Board of Education at the Local Level" Wednesday.

Hjelte To Talk On Recreation

George Hjelte, general manager of the Los Angeles department of recreation and parks, will be giving a series of talks on recreational facilities at the University July 5.

At noon he will speak at a luncheon, Union Parlors XYZ on "Community Park and Recreation Problems."

Guests will include members of the city council, school board, park and recreation board, council on juvenile problems, director of recreation, director of public welfare and safety, the director of the Lincoln school system department of health and physical education and his administrative staff, and others interested in the problem.

At 2 p.m. in Room 107, Burnett, he will discuss "Co-ordination of School Facilities and Personnel into a Community Program of Recreation." This is especially in-

tended for summer school students and faculty members.

Following his talk there will be a question and answer period led by Dr. Walter Beggs.

"Can There be Equal Recreational Opportunities for All?—Co-ordination of All Community Resources for Recreation" will be his topic at 8 p.m. in Love Library Auditorium. PTA presidents, recreation chairmen and physical education teachers from the public schools have been especially invited to this session.

Hjelte has just returned from the President's Conference of Physical Fitness of American Youth which was held June 18 and 19.

He has been with the Los Angeles department since 1947. Previous to that he was superintendent of recreation for Westchester County, New York and for Berkeley, Calif. Before that he was an instructor of physical education.

A member of various professional organizations in the field of physical education and recreation, Hjelte has served as Chairman of the Advisory Council of the National Recreation Association, and has twice served as the president of that organization. In 1952 he was the director of the National Recreation Workshop.

He is the author of "Administration of Public Recreation," a handbook in the field, and is co-author of several other books. He has also contributed several articles to professional magazines.

Doris Growcock: 'Tempest' Set, Masks Result Of Thesis Study

Students who see the University Theater production of "The Tempest" July 28 and 29, will be seeing, if they observe the settings, the final product of a graduate study.

Doris Ann Growcock, for work on her thesis in dramatic work, designed the unusual set for the Shakespearean play.

Working closely with Max Whittaker, director for the production, Miss Growcock designed a model replica of the stage setting.

The setting represents a place on a faraway island, inhabited by fantastic, inhuman creatures.

Miss Growcock also designed and drew up the masks which will be used in the play. These are of a special design which will make them more mobile than the usual type of mask.

Although only one setting is used for the play, its design is such as to give it a mobility of playing areas and through the use of lights it will be possible to vary the effects of the setting, Whittaker explained.

Miss Growcock has also been studying the possibility for the use of a dance movement to project the idea of the play. This would be through the use of "laminated movement" a style developed by a German dramatist, which has been much discussed but little used, at least in this country.

The scale models and the masks for the play will have a further use, Whittaker explained. They will be used in one of the television movies produced by the speech and drama department.

Chancellor Begins Trip For Turkey

Chancellor Clifford M. Hardin and his wife left Wednesday afternoon for Ankara, Turkey, where he will confer with Turkish officials on the first-year progress of the University contract with Turkey.

Dr. Hardin said he is scheduled to visit the site in Eastern Turkey of the proposed Ataturk University, which will be patterned after a U. S. land-grant college.

At present, the University has a field staff of 14 people at Ankara, headed by Dr. Marvel Baker. The staff has two objectives, to assist in strengthening various departments at the University of Ankara and to advise in the construction from the ground up of the new Ataturk University.

Dr. Hardin expects to spend approximately two weeks in Turkey, returning to Lincoln July 23.
