

### Three Addresses: George Hjelte To Speak On Recreation Thursday

Community recreation will be the theme of three major speeches to be given at the University Thursday by George Hjelte, general manager of the Los Angeles City Department of Recreation and Parks.

He will discuss "Community Park and Recreation Problems" at the Thursday noon luncheon sponsored by the Lincoln Park and Recreation Board.

Luncheon guests will include the Lincoln City Council, the school board, the Council on Juvenile Problems, the superintendent of schools and his health, physical education and recreation directors, the superintendent of parks and his staff, and the director of recreation and his staff.

The luncheon will be held at 12:15 p.m. in Parlors XYZ of the Union.

Hjelte will discuss "Coordinating School Facilities and Personnel into a Community Program of Recreation" at 2 p.m. in Room 107, Burnett Hall. This meeting will be held primarily for University Summer Sessions students and faculty members.

The theme for the evening meeting will be "Can There Be Equal Recreational Opportunities for All?—Coordinating All Community Resources for Recreation." Those attending will include the Lincoln PTA presidents and recreational

chairmen and the physical education and recreation personnel of the city schools.

The meeting will be held at 8 p.m. in Love Library Auditorium.

The afternoon and evening meetings are open to the public.

Hjelte has held his present post since 1947. He previously served as superintendent of recreation for the City of Los Angeles from 1936 to 1939 and from 1933 to 1947. He was superintendent of recreation for Westchester County, New York, from 1930 to 1933.

He was superintendent of recreation and director of physical education at Berkeley, Calif., from 1921 to 1926 and was assistant state superintendent of physical education for California from 1919 to 1921.

Hjelte has just returned from the President's Conference on Physical Fitness of American Youth, held at Annapolis, Md.

He is chairman of the advisory council of the National Recreation Association and a past president of the American Recreation Society. He was director of the National Recreation Workshop in 1952. He was a member of the state board of the California Congress of Parents and Teachers for four years and this year was a guest speaker at the national PTA convention.

### Handicraft Shop To Feature Copper

Union Handicraft Lessons will be held in the Craft Shop of the Union at 7 p.m. Tuesday. This is the third in a series of lessons.

Mrs. Robert Nelson will give instruction in copper tooling.

Following the class instruction period, there will be time for enrollees to work on individual projects.

Thursday night, the Craft Shop will be open from 7 to 9 p.m. with an opportunity to work at copper enameling, copper tooling, leatherwork and other crafts.

### Panel To Consider France, Africa

France and North Africa will be the topic for the first of two World Trouble Spot forums to be held at the University this summer.

The topic will be discussed by three faculty members at 2 p.m. Thursday in Love Library Auditorium. The presentation also will feature the latest in audio-visual teaching aids.

Taking part will be Colbert Held, assistant professor of geography; Wallace Peterson, assistant professor of economics, and Dalmas Nelson, instructor in political science.

In charge of the forum will be Jack McBride, director of education television.

### Education Looks To Laymen

Recognition of the responsibilities and impact of boards of education in the community as well as the school is one of today's big problems.

This belief was expressed by O. H. Roberts Jr. of Evansville, Ind., immediate past president of the National School Boards Association. He presented his views at a Board of Education Workshop at the University.

It is significant, he said, that school boards are now being looked to for leadership.

During the last 10 years, school boards as groups and laymen both in groups and individually have reawakened to their responsibilities in education, Roberts said.

"We have now reached the place," he said, "to take a look at what to do about this reawakening and find what is the responsi-

bility of the layman for solutions of problems of education."

The National School Boards Association has just received a grant from the Fund for Advancement of Education to conduct such a study which will be directed by Roberts.

Among the things which they must determine, he said, are the best techniques for laymen and professional educators to work together.


Roberts said he believed the basic thing that has to be concluded is that only by working together will education problems be solved.

"There are too few instances where we have recognized that solution of problems must be done by organized interest groups working for a common cause," he said. "If we laymen are to play our part we must get together as citizens and as school board members."

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### Cannon Given Recognition At Luncheon

Dr. Kenneth Cannon, Associate Professor of Home Economics at the University for a number of years, was guest of honor at a luncheon meeting of the Nebraska Council of Family Life Education Thursday noon at the YWCA.

Dr. Cannon, who will leave Sept. 1 to join the faculty of Brigham Young University at Provo, Utah, is a past president of the Family Life Council and has given leadership to a number of Institutes sponsored by the group.

Tribute was paid to Dr. Cannon's leadership in family life education by Dr. Otto Holberg, University Extension division, and Mrs. Dorothy Switzer, President of the Council.

In an address to the group, Dr. Cannon described a number of research projects which are being carried on at the University, and expressed the hope that increased emphasis may be given to family relations courses in elementary education.

Sports reels on Modern Basketball will be shown in the Main Lounge of the Union from 11:45 to 12:30 noon July 12.

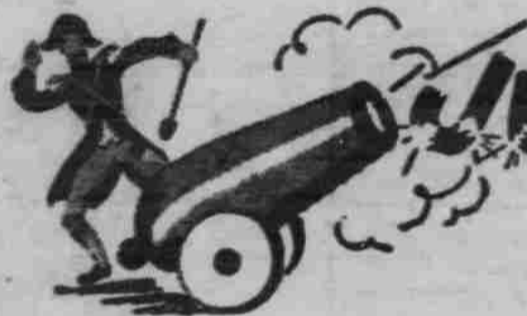
Coaches working on advanced degrees will be interested in the pointers on basketball technique and strategy, according to Bob Handy, Union activities director.

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
