Marshall Scholarship Lists Open

Lists are now open for U.S. college students to apply for a twoyear Marshall Scholarship award, for study at a British University. The scholarship now in its third year of operation, was set up in 1953 as a token of British appre-

ciation for U.S. Marshall Aid. The scholarships are for two years' study at any British university, plus a cash award of \$1,540 a year for living expenses and transportation to and from the United Kingdom.

Applications are considered by regions, North Eastern, Southern, Middle Western and Pacific. The awards will be made on the basis of character as well as scho-

lastic attainment. The scholarship is open to any American student under twentyeight years of age and with three years of college. Any student wishing to apply for this scholarship may pick up an application from Dean Harold Wise in Room 111 in the Social Science Building.
