Last week the startling Huskers upset highly regarded Missouri in one of the nation's most stunning reversals. Nebraska used the return to form of ailing Willie Greenlaw, All-Big Seven halfback last year, to edge the boys from the "show me" state.

Nebraska is in excellent physieal condition and their homecoming victory last week lifted squad spirit that had been high all year. Coach Pete Elliot has made two

changes in starting lineup on the basis of showings made last week. Junior George Harshman will start at quarterback and Greenlaw will go at right half-

It was Harshman's forty yard fieldgoal that gave Nebraska their margin of victory last Saturday. The addition of Harshman to the lineup gives Nebraska a steady extra point man in the contest at all times. Up to now, the chore has been handled by sophomore Larry Naviaux, who has been somewhat erratic.

Standouts so far this season for the Jayhawks have been fullback Homer Floyd, tackle Ed Prelock and end Jim Letcavits. Floyd is the leading ground gainer for the Jayhawks with 450 yards.
