Exam Slate **Explained**

Jo Bender, student member of the Faculty Senate Calendar Committee, explained to the Student Council Wednesday the tentative eight-day final exam schedule.

The report was in accordance with a motion passed by the Student Council on March 13 which eight day exam proposal.

Miss Bender stated that the faculty calendar committee, working within the framework of the 1957-58 Calendar which was okayed eight day final exam period on March 12. The Faculty Senate, according

to Miss Bender, shortened the final exam period to one week on May a Council poll in October of 1955 which indicated that students favored a two week final exam period the Senate rescinded their action of May 1, 1955.

In November of 1955 an alternative calendar for 1956-57 with ten days for final examinations was passed by the Senate, Miss Bender stated.



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
