The problem of school district reorganization in Nebraska, called one of the acute problems in state education, will be the concern of the Clinic Monday, according to Leslie Chislom, chairman.

The Clinic on the Reorganization of School Districts will be held at the University Monday from 7:30 to 9 p.m. in Love Library Auditorium, according to Dr. Frank Sorenson, summer sessions director

The purpose of the conference is to give a brief overview in the form of the basic ABC's of school district reorganization, with major attention focused on problems of reorganization in Nebraska, Dr. Chislom stated.

Four educators will deliver addresses, Dr. Sorenson said.
