Anthology Deadlines Announced

The National Poetry Association has announced the deadlines for submission of poems for possible inclusion in two poetry anthologies.

Original poems by students for inclusion in the next edition of the College Students Poetry Anthology must be submitted by Nov. 5.

The deadline for submission of verse by teachers and librarians to the National Teachers Anthology will be Jan. 1, 1958.

Any student attending college is eligible to submit his verse for inclusion in the student anthology. There is no limitation as to form or theme, but shorter works are preferred, the association announced.

There are no fees or charges for either acceptance or submission of verse. Each poem must be typed or printed on a separate sheet, and must bear the name and home address of the student as well as the name of the college he attends.

Manuscripts should be sent to the Offices of the Association, National Poetry Association, 3210 Selby Avenue, Los Angeles 34, Calif.

Forms may be obtained by writing to the Conference Board of Associated Research Councils Committee on International Exchange of Persons, 2101 Constitution Ave. Wash. 25, D.C.

Staff members who have served one or more years will be given preference. The fellowships are not granted for work to be used as theses for advanced degrees.

Fifteen fellowships will be available with stipends of \$1000 each.

Final drafts must be handed in by October 15, according to Keith Smith, publicity chairman.

Medical Test Required Once For Admission

All students who enter any accredited medical college must take the national Medical College Admission Test at least once, according to Eugene Dowell, Pre-Medical adviser.

The last test of this nature which will be effective for 1958 admissions will be given, October 29, 1957. Application forms are now available at 306 Bessey Hall.

Applications must reach the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey, by October 15.
