Fellowship Assistance Announced

The National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council will again assist the National Science Foundation in its seventh fellowship program which has just been announced by the Foundation.

The NSF plans to award approximately 850 graduate and 85 regular postdoctoral fellowships for scientific study during the 1958-1959 academic year. These fellowships, open to citizens of the United States, are awarded solely on the basis of ability.

They are offered in the mathematical, physical, medical and biological fields, in engineering, anthropology, psychology (except clinical) and geography; and in certain inter-disciplinary fields and fields of convergence between the natural and social sciences.

Graduate fellowships are available to those who are working toward the masters' or doctoral degrees in the first, intermediate or terminal year of graduate study. College seniors who expect to receive a baccalaureate degree during the 1957-1958 academic year are also eligible to apply.

Postdoctoral fellowships are available to individuals who, as of the beginning of their fellowships, have a Ph. D. in one of the fields listed above or who have had research training and experience equivalent to that represented by such a degree. In addition, holders of the M. D., D. D. S., or D. V. M. degree, who wish to obtain further training for a career in research, are eligible provided they can present an acceptable plan of study and research.

Fellowships Announced By Foundation

Post-doctoral fellowships for the study of International Relations have been announced by the Ford Foundation.

The fellowships provide financial support for one year of study beginning no later than Jan. 1, 1959. Applicants must have received their Ph.D. degree by Feb., 1958. Training may be undertaken either in the United States or abroad.

A limited number of Foreign Area Training Fellowships for the academic year 1958-59 are also available. Beginning students, advanced graduate students, or young faculty members may apply.

Applications must be filed by Nov. 1, 1957. Additional information may be secured in the Graduate College Office.

Ike Observes 67th

President Eisenhower observed his 67th birthday and expressed warm thanks for gifts and best wishes.

This was the day for temporarily setting aside domestic and international troubles to make way for happy birthday salutes.

One of the first came from the staff of the White House which presented the President with a bouquet of 67 red roses.

The president planned a quiet birthday observance.

Hoffa Election Rigged?

James R. Hoffa has been barred from taking office as president of the Teamsters Union by a 10-day restraining order issued by Federal District Judge F. Dickinson Letts.

Judge Letts acted on the plea of a 13-man New York Teamsters group which claimed Hoffa's election was rigged by delegates illegally seated at the Teamsters convention held 10 days ago.

The Teamsters union's lawyers immediately made plans to carry Letts' order to the Federal Appeals Court in an effort to reverse it.

Hoffa would have taken the Teamsters reins Tuesday, when retiring President Dave Beck resigned. Beck's term runs to Dec. 1.

Space Missiles

Britain announced in United Nation yesterday that it is ready to join the U.S. and other countries in talks aimed at harnessing space missiles for peaceful uses.

Allan Noble, British Minister of State, told the U.N. political committee that there is still time to bring these devices under control despite "recent events."

He suggested that a technical group might be set up by the U.N. "to start work on this problem of controlling space objects."
