Former Editor Of Nebraskan Given Grant

Bruce Brugmann, former University student, has been awarded the 1957 Gilbert Hitchcock Scholarship for study at the Graduate School of Journalism of Columbia University, according to Edward Barrett, dean of the Graduate School. The \$1,000 scholarship was established in 1934 by Mrs. Gilbert Hitchcock of Washington, D.C., as a memorial to her late husband, former United States Senator from Nebraska and founder and publisher of the Omaha World-Herald. The scholarship is awarded each year to a resident of Nebraska or a graduate of a Nebraska college or university. Brugmann, 22, was born at Hull, Iowa. He was graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1957 with a B. A. degree. He majored in English and Philosophy. During successive semesters at the University, Brugmann served on the staff of The Nebraskan as reporter, exchange editor, copy editor, sports editor, editorial page editor and editor. During his tenure as editor and editorial page editor, The Nebraskan received two All-American Honor Ratings from the Associated Collegiate Press. In his senior year at Nebraska, he also served as a reporter on the staff of the Lincoln Star.

Scientists Warns

A leading American scientist told a Senate committee inquiring into the U.S. missile program that "Russia will leave us far behind" in the development of nuclear weapons if "we continue at our present rate."

Dr. Edward Teller, an expert on nuclear weapons, was the opening witness in the Senate inquiry Monday.

Board Of Regents Okays Farm Sale

The University Board of Regents Saturday approved the sale of a 240-acre Dawson County farm for the price of \$115,000 to Robert Geiger, present tenant on the farm.

The farm is part of the Frances Sheldon estate, which was willed to the University for the construction of an art gallery.

Mr. Geiger offered a bid of \$450 per acre for 80 acres and \$49.75 per acre for the remaining 160 acres.

The farm is known as the "Fannie Anderson Place."

Colin Jackson Addresses Air ROTC

A former visiting lecturer of political science at the University, Colin Jackson, told a meeting of 400 Air ROTC cadets here that unless the defense command of Europe is revamped in the next three years, and unless the continental defense command of the United States is revamped in the next five years, the safety of these defenses will be in great danger. Jackson, who is at present a commentator for the BBC and a lecturer at Oxford University, recently toured the Middle East of which he made this comment: "People confuse Arab nationalism, which Russia has been exploiting, with Communism."

Reports of the spread of Communism in that area have been exaggerated, he said.

Problems facing NATO in establishing an intermediate missile defense in Europe within three years would be:

—France would object to giving the U.S. control of missiles in their country and Norway would object to missile stations in Germany.

—Congress undoubtedly would object to the U.S. sharing missile secrets with Europe.
