

University Scholarship Applications Filing Deadline Scheduled February 22

University undergraduates students who will have completed 24 hours of credit at the University by June may make applications next month for upperclass scholarships.

The Office of the Division of Student Affairs has announced it will begin accepting applications for scholarships for the 1958-59 school year on Feb. 3. The deadline for filing applications will be Feb. 22.

The application forms and a list of available scholarships may be obtained at the Student Affairs office. A booklet explaining the scholarships in more detail is also available.

Students on Ag campus may obtain applications at the office of the Dean of the College of Agriculture.

General qualifications for the upperclass scholarships are:

- Scholarships are available to upperclass students upon completion of 24 hours of credit at the University. Students graduating from Nebraska Junior Colleges with high scholastic records may be recommended by the Dean or President of their college for the University Junior College Regents Scholarship.
- The receipt of an award is expected to carry a minimum of 12 credit hours each semester during the year for which the award is made.
- The student must present a good scholastic record; in most cases an over-all grade average of 6.5 or above is required. However, there are certain awards that are made to worthy students who have grade averages slightly below 6.5 and a small number of awards are made on the basis of financial need to students with an average below 6.0.
- All applicants for upperclass general scholarships, with the exception of seniors, seniors-to-be, or students in the Colleges of Dentistry, Law, or Medicine, must take a general comprehensive examination. A student needs to take this test once during his college years. It will be given on Saturday, March 1, from 8:30 a.m. to noon. The score from this test is combined with the grade average to determine a relative rating.
- The student must be worthy of financial assistance. Financial need is an important consideration in many of the scholarships. Even when financial need has been established, the applicant must show by his academic progress and by good conduct that he is worthy of such aid. A notable exception to establishing financial need is the University Regents Scholarship which is awarded in recognition of high scholastic achievement.

6. An acceptable University record is necessary before an applicant is considered. Notification of awards will be made by July 15, it was announced. Among the scholarships available to be used in any college of the University, their eligibility requirements, and amounts are:

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Students To Decide On Revised Charter

Students will vote on the Student Tribunal Charter, appearing below, at the time they pay their fees, according to Dave Keene, chairman of the Student Council Tribunal Committee.

The Student Council has already accepted the Charter. If passed by the Student body, the charter must be approved by the faculty senate and the Board of Regents.

A previous charter was passed last year by the student body. However, the Student Council said that some revisions needed to be made before the Charter could be sent to the Faculty Senate, Keene said. Students will vote on the revised version.

Student Tribunal Charter

We, the students of the University of Nebraska, with the consent of the Board of Regents, do hereby create and establish this charter for the judgment of student discipline.

Article I
Name: The name of this body shall be the Student Tribunal of the University of Nebraska.

Article II
Purpose: The purpose of this Tribunal shall be to serve as the student court on matters of student discipline that are referred to it by the Division of Student Affairs and/or agencies of the Faculty Senate.

Article III
Powers: The Student Tribunal shall have the following powers:
Section 1. The Tribunal shall hear all cases of student discipline that are referred to it by the Division of Student Affairs and/or agencies of the Faculty Senate.
Section 2. The Tribunal shall recommend a decision to the Dean of Student Affairs and/or the proper agencies of the Faculty Senate.
Section 3. The Tribunal shall establish its own rules of procedure.

Article IV
Membership: The Student Tribunal shall have the following composition:
Section 1. The Student Tribunal shall have the following composition:
a. Four Student Judges who are seniors in the University.
b. One Student Judge from the College of Law who, at the time of selection, has successfully completed at least one year of Law.
c. Two Student Judges who are juniors in the University.
Section 2. Student Judges:
a. Two Faculty Judges who are members of the Faculty Senate.
b. Qualifications:
1) A Student Judge must have a grade average which places him in the upper third of his college class. Arts & Sciences, Teachers, etc.
2) No student may serve on both the Student Council and the Tribunal during the same academic year.
3) No student who seeks membership on the Tribunal may participate in the selection of Tribunal Judges.
c. Selection:
1) Students may make application to the Student Council for membership on the Tribunal.
2) The University Faculty Senate Committee on Student Affairs may name additional applicants to the Student Council for membership on the Tribunal.
3) Junior members of the Tribunal shall automatically become candidates for Senior positions.
4) The Student Council shall select the Student Judges from among the aforementioned applicants and candidates by May 1.
5) All student vacancies on the Tribunal shall be filled by the Student Council.
Section 3. Faculty Judges:
The Chancellor shall appoint two Faculty Judges from the recommended staff from nominations made to him by the University Faculty Senate Committee on Committees.

Article V
Terms of Office:
Section 1. The term of office for Student Judges shall consist of one academic year beginning with the fall semester.
Section 2. The Faculty Judges shall serve four (4) year terms except as hereinafter provided and may serve no more than two (2) terms.
a. The first Faculty Judge shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years.
b. The second Faculty Judge shall be appointed for a term of four (4) years.
c. Thereafter, one Faculty Judge shall be appointed every second year, for a term of four (4) years.
d. The term of office for Faculty Judges shall begin with the fall semester.

Article VI
Duties of the Student Tribunal:
Section 1. The Student Tribunal in September of each year shall establish a regular meeting time.
Section 2. The Student Tribunal in September of each year shall publish in the Daily Nebraskan its rules of procedure.
Section 3. The Student Tribunal shall keep a complete written record of its proceedings and actions.

Article VII
Amendments:
Section 1. The Student Council with the approval of the student body may propose amendments to the University Faculty Senate Committee on Student Affairs.
Section 2. This Charter may be amended only by the Board of Regents upon recommendation of the University Faculty Senate Committee on Student Affairs.
