

Huskies Down Nation's Ex (Now) Top Quintet

Fitzpatrick Scores 19 As Bushmen Stagger Country's Sports World Again

Nebraska's torrid Cornhuskers, with a 19 point performance by a torrid Willie Fitzpatrick, smashed Kansas State, 55-48 Monday night.

The win was the Huskers fourth straight and their second in a row over a national power. It also ended a series losing streak for Nebraska against Kansas State. The Wildcats had won eight straight from their conference neighbors in the last four years.

Kansas State started things like they would make the Husker fans, who packed the Coliseum 8,800 strong, a gloomy group before the night was over. Fabulous Bob Boozer poured in nine points as the Wildcats jumped to a quick 9-3 lead. But right there

things suddenly stopped going the Wildcats way. Hirsch Turner's falling away jump shot, a true Turner spectacular, started Nebraska's comeback. Bob Harry dropped a jumper on a rebound right underneath and then tied it with a long set shot with 11:51 remaining in the first half.

The Huskers didn't quite get over the hill just then, however. Boozer matched anything the Bushmen could produce and the score was tied five times and the lead changed hands twice more before Boozer himself put Nebraska ahead to stay.

Riled by a pushing foul called on him under the Kansas State basket, big fellow protested to Turner vigorously moments later when he smashed into Don Smidt on a contested rebound. For this referee John Lloyd assessed a technical. Smidt dropped one of his two and Gary Reimers added the technical to make it 22-29.

Since a technical meant Nebraska got the ball even if Reimers made his shot, Nebraska took advantage of an out of bounds play to ahead for good, 24-19. Nebraska was in command

the entire second half and the game reached rout proportions when Fitzpatrick rampaged to 12 straight points during one spell. The Missouri traveler drove around his taller guard, sophomore Wally Frank for three easy buckets. He added two more cringles on stolen balls and topped it off by outbounding both Frank and 6'5" Jim Fischer for an easy two just under the bucket.

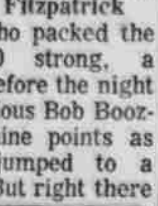
Kansas State played without all-conference center Jack Parr. The 6'9" Parr was kept at home by a violent cold which forced him to miss the last two Wildcat contests.

Boozer led all scorers with 20 points. The 6'8" Omahan scored 15 in the first half, but fouled out with 8:31 to play. The fancy pivot scored all his team's points during the first 11 minutes of action.

For Nebraska, everyone stood out but there was no doubt that Fitzpatrick was having his greatest night of the season. The 6'4" senior added 10 rebounds to his 19 points and handled the ball backed him under the bangboards with 10 more while Gary Reimers hit 14 points for second high scoring honors.

Husker Outfield Squad Brightens Baseball Scene As Three Return

Ed note—This is the second of a Daily Nebraskan series dealing with Husker baseball prospects. The third, covering the infield, will appear next week.

This early in the year, a baseball coach will never admit that part of his lineup is "set." There is too much chance of a talented rookie or two beating an expected regular out of his job.

However, just because Pinky Higgins won't tell who his regular leftfielder is going to be doesn't mean that Ted Williams won't be out there on opening day. And just because Nebraska's Tony Sharpe is noncommittal about his starting outfield, don't think it won't be Gene

Torczon, Gary Reimers and Larry Lewis.

It was these three men who provided a solid outfield punch for Nebraska last year and their continued success in the "garden" will have a lot to do with Nebraska's Big Eight title chances.

Torczon is the power hitter of the group. The big right-hander hit at a steady .290 clip last year and led the club in RBI's from his spot as third hitter.

Torczon could be switched from left to pitching duties this year, however, if the Husker pitching situation doesn't jell. The rangy right-hander threw for Columbus in the Pioneer Night League

last summer although his University pitching career had been hampered by a bad shoulder. This spring, he claims his arm has been feeling as good as new.

Reimers, a right-hander who has been leading the basketball team this winter, gives Nebraska a steady fielder and hitter in center field while Lewis provides left handed power at the plate.

Sophomores who might break into the outfield if injuries or position shifts leave a vacancy, include LeRoy Zentic and left-hander, Bob Semin. The ubiquitous Zentic is also trying out at first base and pitch.

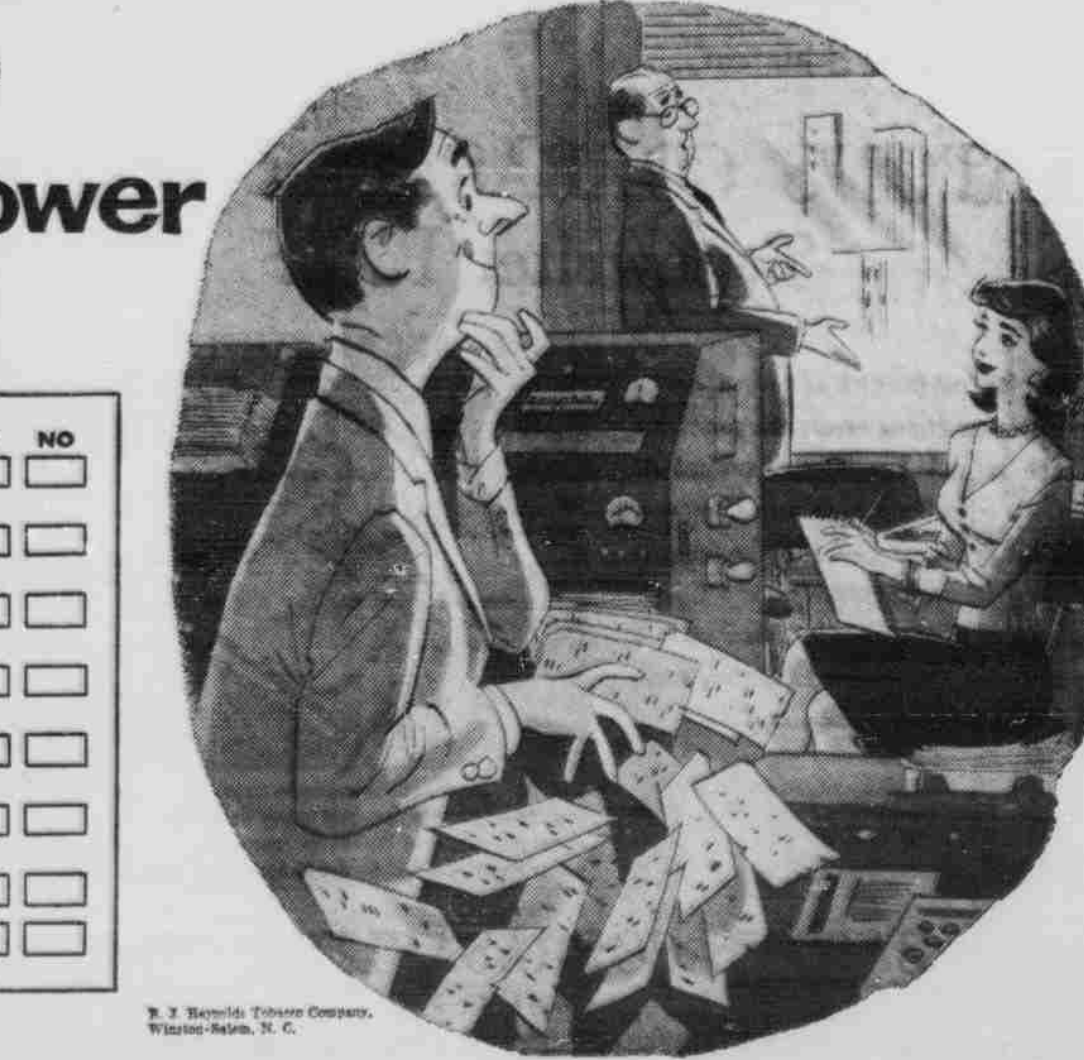
