Beauty Gets Brain Help Miss Nebraska Fund Started

Announcement of the Miss Nebraska Scholarship foundation was made Thursday at a joint meeting of the scholarship donors and officers of the sponsoring organization, the Nebraska Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Louis Roper, Miss Nebraska Pageant chairman, said the Pepsi Cola Bottlers of Nebraska have made available a total of \$1,700 to be distributed to the winner and runners-up at the state pageant to be held in Lincoln April 26.

The fund will be broken down as follows: \$750 to Miss Nebraska, \$350 to the first runner-up, \$200 each to the second runner-up, the girl selected as Miss Congeniality (a title conferred by the contestants themselves), and the girl selected for having the most talent.

Mr. Ray Nausilas, scholarship committee chairman, said the money will be used by the girls to further their education at an accredited school.

Certainly Proud
 "We're certainly proud to be associated with the Miss Nebraska Pageant," said Paul Larson, president of the Pepsi Cola Bottling Company of Nebraska.

"And with the establishment of this scholarship foundation, we know we'll be helping some talented and worthy young ladies to achieve the future they desire."

Also present at the conference was Miss Kay Nielson, Miss Nebraska of 1957. Her successor will be named next month when local winners from 12 Nebraska towns will compete here in Lincoln at the Pershing Municipal Auditorium.

Summer Study Cheap In 12 Spanish Schools

Twelve Spanish universities will offer low cost programs of travel and study this summer, for U.S. students and teachers, according to Homer Rees of the Spanish Tourist Office in New York.

Many Courses
 Courses which may be taken at the institutions include language, history, literature, philosophy, art and music, for which college and professional growth credits will be given.

Low living costs have made it possible for more than 20,000 students and faculty representatives to study overseas, Rees said.

Tuition fees range from \$12 to \$24 and student residences charge from \$1 to \$3 a day including meals, while courtesy cards, issued by the university, allow reduced rates on books, medical care and museums, he added.

Madrid Popular
 Courses at the University of Madrid, offered by the Institute of Hispanic Culture and the Department of Cultural Relations have been most popular with Americans, Rees continued, but extensive programs are also available at eleven other schools.
