Separate Cruises Planned For NROTC Midshipmen

First Classmen Will See Orient, Others Will Visit South America

This year for the first time the 1st and 3rd class regular midshipmen from Nebraska will be on different cruises.

Cruise "Bravo" for the 1st classmen will go to the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific where the midshipmen will board regularly deployed fleet ships and participate in standard fleet exercises. The midshipmen will report to San Francisco June 20 where they will board chartered commercial air transportation for the Orient. Their return from the 7th Fleet will also be by air, with arrival in San Francisco Aug. 9.

Killer Group

Cruise "X-Ray" for the 3rd class midshipmen will be with a hunter-killer group in the Southern Atlantic. The midshipmen will embark from Norfolk, Virginia, June 17 and return Aug. 8.

First class contract students, assigned to the Eastern and mid-Pacific (also a hunter-killer operation) will embark from Alameda, California, July 11, and will terminate their cruise Aug. 9.

The guest experts will represent government, education and the media of mass communications.

The 13 programs will deal with American policy in regard to such areas as the Western alliance, Germany, Iron Curtain countries, Latin America and the Soviet Union.

Camp Job Good For Suntan But Memories Best From Counseling

A gorgeous suntan—a few dollars pay—and a little bit of work.

Each summer this illusion of camp counseling intrigues college girls to pack their summer togs and sports equipment and head for the nearest girls' camp.

"No office job or summer school for us," they boast, "just a summer in the wide open spaces."

After one week of eating with, sleeping near and listening to mothers' "little dears", however, counselors look back and doubt their sanity on the day they signed their camp contracts. The contracts never mentioned such things as braiding five heads of hair a day, dealing with extreme homesick cases and chasing loads out of their own beds at night.

Counselors somehow survive the summer, though, and seem to enjoy their camping experiences more when reminiscing about them months later.

"I was out on the river in a rowboat one day with six 'darlings,' a counselor relates, "and for some reason I wasn't paying attention to where I was going. Before I knew it, the boat was under a dead branch hanging out over the river. I commanded the squealing girls to squat down in the bottom of the boat so that the short twigs on the tree branch wouldn't poke their eyes out. I was laughing so hard myself I could hardly maneuver the boat out of the predicament. Believe me, I never heard the end of that one from the campers."

"The most terrifying experience I had at camp," another counselor said, "occurred on our night off. Four counselors had taken a canoe and had gone a mile down the river to the nearest town. About 10 p.m. we noticed that a summer storm was brewing, so we hurriedly started the trip back to camp. About a fourth of the way back, a sudden cloudburst and high wind swept in from the north nearly upsetting our canoe. It took everything we had to paddle over to the shore. When we hopped out of the canoe, one of the girls fell into the river and we pulled her out. None of us had ever been so near death as we were that night on the river."

So, girls, before signing that counseling contract, consider the summer with its — gorgeous suntan — a few dollars pay — a little bit of work — and a thousand unusual experiences. Unless you're ready for the thousand unusual experiences, you'd better reconsider that summer office job.
