Dr. Sorenson Ends Work

6th Volume Written In Geography Series

Dr. Frank Sorenson, chairman of the University department of educational services, has submitted the final volume of his series of six grade school geography books to be published.

The book, "Our United States in a World of Neighbors," is an eight grade book designed to acquaint the students with the geography of the United States as well as with the way in which the life of the nation is associated with other countries.

Co-authors of the book are Norman Carls, chairman of the department of geography of the University of Pittsburgh and Margery Howarth, specialist in the U. S. Bureau of Census.

The previous five books are being used in the third through seventh grades throughout the country. California has recently adopted the series for use in all elementary schools in the state.

According to Dr. Sorenson, the series was prepared in response to a need for a new approach to the study of geography in the air-space age.

The United States is shown "not apart from the world, but as part of the world," said Sorenson.

Outside World

Nevada Air Crash Kills 48

A DC7 airliner and a supersonic fighter-bomber crashed over the desert near Las Vegas, Nev., Monday. All 46 passengers of the United Airlines craft and both of the jet's occupants were killed.

NU, Ten Colleges Study Mo Basin

The University is one of 11 universities which will study problems arising from increasing industrialization of the Missouri River Basin area under a Ford Foundation Grant of \$39,600.

The inter-university program will conduct research in a variety of problems arising from the transition of the basin area from a dominantly agricultural region to one with considerable industry.

The research program headquarters will be at the University of Kansas. University representatives in the program are Dr. A. C. Breckenridge, Professor of Political Science and Dean of the University Faculties, and Dr. John Roberts of the Department of Anthropology.

Ag Royal, Rodeo Slated In May

The annual Aggie Royal and Rodeo will be held May 14-17 at the University College of Agriculture.

Events will include the Dairy Royal May 14, Block and Bridle Showmanship contest May 15, Aggie Royal Ball including presentation of the Goddess of Agriculture and Whiskey King on May 16; and a quarter-horse show parade and the Rodeo afternoon and evening performance on May 17.

Several annual events on campus are being combined into one week's activities this year for the first time.


Two Grants Given By Western Electric
