In selecting the students, the department sent a letter to each of 550 Nebraska high school instructors to recommend qualified students. About 100 names were received from this method.

An additional 50 students were selected from those entering freshmen who attained high scores on the general placement examination. This combined group was given examinations in algebra and trigonometry, and the 22 were selected.

Course Work The course will cover material in analytic geometry and calculus in three semesters in a more rigorous manner.

Duley Cited For Service In Ag Work

Dr. Frank Duley, agronomy professor at the University Agricultural College, was honored for more than 40 years of service to agriculture at a banquet Tuesday night.

He was cited for his service to research, professional workers, students and farmers. He is a soil conservationist for the Agricultural Research Service and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Throughout his career, Dr. Duley has authored or co-authored eight research bulletins, 14 other bulletins and some 56 journal articles.

Dr. Duley's soil research work was called "a basis for setting up runoff and erosion control experiments throughout the country," by D. E. Hutchinson, state soil conservationist.
