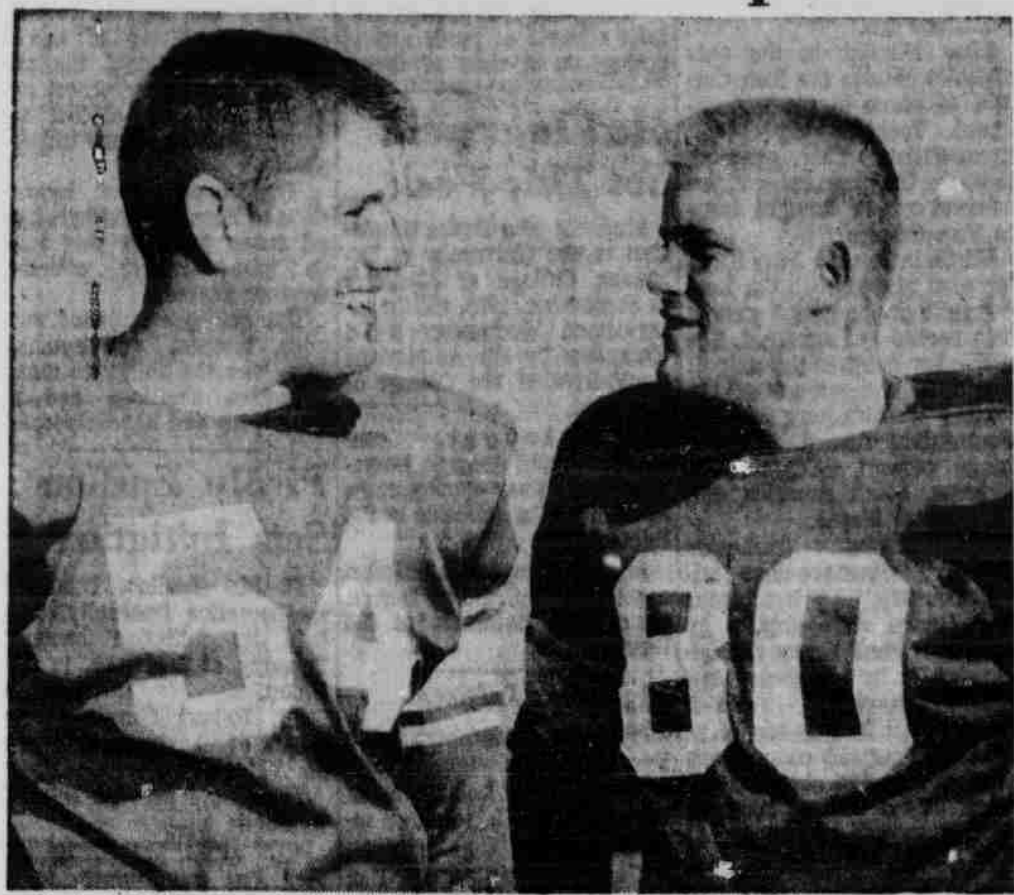

# Pitt Panthers-Phooie; We're After Oklahoma

## The Beginning and The End

The last thing on the minds of 23,000 Parents Day customers who trudged into Memorial Stadium last Saturday was the possibility of the Huskers' upsetting their fearsome opponents. Most were thinking of Pittsburgh's recent win over Notre Dame and its tie with Army, and of Nebraska's lacings at the hands of Purdue, Syracuse, and Missouri.

They foresaw only another long, futile afternoon for the Nebraskans.

### Potent Offense

The gloomy fans forgot that the week before Nebraska had shown a surprisingly potent offense while losing to Kansas, that the Huskers were for the first time in weeks operating at almost full-strength, and that NU's seniors—few but outstanding—were making their last home appearance. They even forgot that earlier this season the Huskers had tripped another Eastern power, Penn State, on the same field.

So 23,000 Husker fans received a shock from which many of them are still recovering.

Nebraska, trampled by two non-conference opponents and handed a series of so-near-and-yet-so-far losses in the Big Eight, came back with a 14-6 triumph that burst Pitt's Orange Bowl bubble and added another thrilling chapter to the annals of Cornhusker football tradition.

### What?

What did it? Some of the most jarring blocking and tackling ever witnessed in the Stadium. The ability of the Huskers to make key first downs and at the same time shove off the Panthers on

fourth-and-two situations.

A daring passing attack that produced both NU touchdowns, and an alert pass defense that twice intercepted Panther aerials and batted down countless others in the closing minutes. And the sheer durability of the Huskers, who would limp off the field only to return moments later to the bruising battle.

Who did it? Twenty-three fearless Huskers with a will that five straight losses

couldn't break. And if the spotlight should pause momentarily on any one of them, it is senior halfback Larry Naviaux, who passed for two TD's and scored Nebraska's all-important two-point conversion.

### Michelosen

Pitt Coach John Michelosen gave the Huskers credit for "a great game," and when asked if he had expected this type of play from Nebraska, replied, "Absolutely. They're

always tough."

Bill Jennings, NU coach, was, for the first time in several weeks, a relaxed man after the game. He munched contentedly on an apple.

"There's nothing like winning," he said. He explained the surprising Husker victory, contrasted with losses to less powerful teams, as being due to the improved physical condition of the squad and the absence of costly mistakes from the Huskers' play. (Nebraska did not fumble, have a pass intercepted, or lose a yard on penalties.)

### Fine Tribute

He added that the game was "a fine tribute" to the seniors on the squad, who had worked for years to bring winning football back to Nebraska.

The players gathered in the locker room after the game to sing a rousing chorus of "The Scarlet and the Cream" to tired and smiling coaches. The old Cornhusker spirit, it seems, is a thing of the past, after all not.
