

The last thing on the minds of 23,000 Parents Day custom-ers who trudged into Memoral Stadium last Saturday was the possibility of the Husk-ers' upsetting their fearsome opponents. Most were think-ing of Pittsburgh's recent win over Notre Dame and its tie with Army, and of Ne-braska's lacings at the hands of Purdue, Syracuse, and

Bill Jennings, NU coach, was, for the first time in several weeks, a relaxed man after the game. He munched contentedly on an apple.

"There's nothing like winning," he said. He explained the surprising Husker vic-tory, contrasted with losses to less powerful teams, as being due to the improved phyical condition of the squad and the absence of costly mistakes from the Huskers' play.
