

# Nebraska Topples Rated Marquette

## Bushmen Snag Third Win, 62-60

Three in a row— That's where Nebraska's fighting Cornhuskers stand this morning after downing a tall Marquette team 62-60 in a nip and tuck battle at the Coliseum last night.  
**Rated 14th**  
The Warriors, rated number 17 in the nation after runaway victories over Big Ten clubs Wisconsin and Illinois, were baying at the Husker's heels most of the night, but excepting the early minutes, they could never quite grab the lead.  
**Easy Al Maxey**, ex-teams-mate of Oscar Robertson, and Happy Herschel Turner, the Huskers' ball handling magician, led Nebraska with 18 and 14 points respectively but they had a lot of competent help.  
With 18 minutes to play in the first half, Marquette had a 5-3 lead. Then Maxey took over with some deadly long shooting to pace Nebraska to the lead.  
**Sudden Flurry**  
The margin was a slim one until the half, when a sudden Husker flurry gave the Big Red an apparently solid 33-26 halftime advantage.  
After the half, Nebraskan began their famous semi-stall tactics which brought victories over Kansas and Kansas State last season, and claimed a 40-30 lead.  
But the Warriors just weren't going to let it go by

that easily. Sophomore Don Kojis led a quick Marquette rally which narrowed things to 40-39 with 13 minutes to play.  
Junior sharpshooter, Wayne Hester took over from there with a neat 20 footer. The long cast pumped new life into a Nebraska squad that looked momentarily like it might choke up with victory at its doorstep.  
From there on, Nebraska always seemed to have two points when they needed it. Accurate foul line work took part of the story as the Bushmen made 18 of 26 free casts for 69.2% to 10 of 18 and 55.6 for the visitors.  
With 45 seconds to play, Nebraska had a 62-57 lead. A final Marquette desperation rally made it 62-60.

quette requested the use of the floor at 7 p.m. Among other requests made by Warrior coach Hickey was the use of the bench customarily occupied by the Huskers and Nebraska's first half basket at the south end of the playing floor.  
Billed as a running, fighting team, Marquette was all of that. At one stretch the Warrior's fast break accounted for six straight points before Nebraska could get their zone defense set up.
