

Language Prof Carter Quits

Former Dept. Chairman to Take Illinois Post

Boyd Carter, professor of romance languages for the past 13 years, is resigning from the University staff.

His resignation becomes effective Sept. 1, 1959, when he leaves to become a professor of romance languages at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, Ill.

Close Location
"We chose Carbondale because it is close to St. Louis, my wife's home, and within a day's drive of my home in Virginia," Dr. Carter said. Dr. Carter came to the University in 1945. Two years later, he met and married another Spanish enthusiast, who was teaching school in Wilber.

"She's my research helper," he laughed. "She got her masters degree in Spanish here at the University."

50 Articles Written
With varied interests, Carter has written more than 50 studies and short fiction stories as well as several books. He is co-author of four modern language texts and has written two books about Manuel Gutierrez Najera, Mexico's most famous poet.

Eight months' research in Mexico resulted in three books and several activities. Two of the books will appear in Mexico sometime next year.

"Most of my research was made possible through the University Research Council," Carter explained. "Through this research, I made some discoveries about Najera's writings that hadn't been known before."

Brother's Book Finished
"After my brother's (Ross)

death, I finished his book, "Those Devils in Baggy Pants," which appeared in condensed form in the Readers' Digest and was translated into French and Spanish.

An honorary paratrooper, Carter was made an honorary member of the 82nd Airborne Division for his work. He has also been decorated by the French government for his academic achievements.

"They presented me the 'Palme Academique,' an order established by Napoleon in 1808."

An extensive traveler, Carter studied his sophomore year of college at the Uni-

versity of Toulouse in France. He has also visited Italy, Belgium, Switzerland, Mexico, Central America and several other countries.

Commenting on University students, Dr. Carter said, "My impression is that the students have become much more serious since Sputnik."

Dr. Carter received his bachelor of arts at William and Mary College at Williamsburg, Va. He received his masters and Ph. D. at the University of Illinois in Champagne. A Virginia native, he was born in Duffield, Va.

Teaching high school in Bluefield West Va., for two years, Carter has taught in colleges in Idaho, Wyoming and Iowa. He started a Spanish-American literature program at the University immediately upon his arrival.

"Mrs. Carter and I owe a great deal to Nebraska," Dr. Carter said. "We will miss the University, our friends and Lincoln. On the whole I've been very pleased with the students I've had at Nebraska."
