Organizations
The Subcommittee on Student Organizations will recommend the establishment and termination of any organization for students. It shall be concerned with the structure and financial affairs of all organizations, with the exception of fraternities and sororities, and will review the constitutions.

A Conciliation Committee was adopted which will investigate important problems involving faculty members relation to the University.

A motion concerning the University Policy Committee was tabled and three new members were elected to the Liaison Committee.

Theta Sigma Phi, secretary of Pi Lambda Theta, and a member of Mortar Board and Kappa Kapp Gamma.

"She has served on the Union and YWCA board. She was also a committee chairman of the Union."

"In her sorority Sharon has been activities chairman and is now chairman of the house committee."

She has an approximate 7.5 grade average and is attending the University on a University Grant scholarship.

Rogge Cited
Dwayne Rogge was cited in his letter as an outstanding scholar and leader.

"He has the highest three year average of anyone in the University. He is one of the few persons to attain a perfect average (9). He is a member of Pi Mu Epsilon, honorary math fraternity and Vice-President of Sigma Tau."

He was, at one time, a column writer for the Daily Nebraskan and president of a dorm house. He has been a member of the Student Council for three years and now is the president.

"Last year Dwayne headed the Spring Day Committee and was assistant copy editor of the Blueprint."

During his sophomore year he served as Secretary of Delta Upsilon and is now president of Innocents.

"It is superfluous to say that Dwayne is a leader as this is obvious by his outstanding record."

Not 'Ordinary'
The letter of nomination for Steve Schultz called Schultz no "ordinary leader."

"It is quite one thing for leadership to take the form of 'followership' as it so often does on this campus. It is quite another thing for leadership to show creative genius, which it so seldom does on this campus."

"Before going any further, it might be good to point out the 'ordinary' form of leadership exhibited by Schultz on the campus. He has been the Kosmet Klub skitmaster for Phi Kappa Psi twice. He was elected president of Masquers. He has performed both on stage and behind the scenes at the University Theatre."

"As a columnist for the Daily Nebraskan... he said what he believed, a commodity hard to come by in these days of conformity. He stuck by his beliefs and when, in

his opinion, free expression was chafed, he left the lime-light of the Nebraskan editorial page."

Edited Scrip
"But more than anything else, Schultz' outstanding contribution to the University has been the founding and the editing of Scrip, a literary magazine which has fed the intellectually starved campus with new ideas, introduced it to new writers and gave University students with a flare for letters a chance to be read."

"His interest in letters doesn't stop there, though. Schultz, as president of Masquers, has introduced a playwriting contest to the campus which is also unprecedented."

Of Dick Shugrue, the letter of nomination said:

"Just a suggestion of his range of activities will be sufficient. He is past editor of the Daily Nebraskan, he has served as president of Sigma Delta Chi, he has been consistently one of the top debaters on the University team and was founding president of the new speech therapy honorary."

"During his editorship of the Daily Nebraskan, Dick distinguished himself by his forthrightness and vigor. Characteristically, he chose to defend causes which he knew would be unpopular but in which he believed. He chose his causes with foresight, defended them with dignity, and accepted criticism with patience."

"Few people knew that he has twice served as a counselor for All-State, the University's summer session for outstanding high school students. During both of the summers, Shugrue established himself as one of the most popular counselors serving."

Joel Moss To Telecast Family Series

Dr. Joel Moss will appear on a new series of programs based on marriage and family life on Channel 12 beginning Feb. 4.

The series, prepared by Dr. Moss, will consist of 15 half-hour sessions. They will be correlated with Dr. Moss' evening home economics 191 class which can also be taken for credit through the University Extension Division.

The program will emphasize marriage relationships and will attempt to present problems and solutions involved in working out harmonious relationships.
