

Religion Comes Into Focus On The Campus Next Week

Student and religious leaders on campus have joined efforts to bring Religious Emphasis Week to the campus Feb. 8 to 15.

The Council on Religion is sponsoring the week to enable students to better know the organizations and professional religious men on campus.

Activities' Purpose

Ray Balfour, head of the arrangement committee of the Council, said, "The purpose of Religious Emphasis Week is to point out the significance of religion in a person's life."

The council plans to reach the student body in three ways: by sponsoring seminars which are open to the public, by sending speakers into campus organizations, and by sending speakers to the living quarters, sororities, fraternities, etc., if they are asked to come.

Local Speakers

Balfour said the biggest change in the plans for this year is that only local speakers will be used. He said this

should create a more lasting impression than did speakers who left after their talks and never met the students.

Kicking off the week will be a seminar Sunday, Feb. 8 at 8 p.m. in Love Library Auditorium. "Science, Art, Religion" will be the topic. Speakers are Dr. Paul Meadows, professor of Sociology, Dean Phillip Colbert of student af-

airs, and Steve Shultz, senior in English.

Monday's schedule includes a seminar "Authority of the Bible" at 8:30 p.m. at the Cotner School of Religion.

The panel discussion will feature Rabbi Herald Stern, Father Meyers of the Newman Club and Father Armstrong of the Episcopal Chapel. Moderator will be Charles Patterson, professor of philosophy.

No Meaning

A change was made because the old name, Barb Activities Board for Women, was meaningless to most persons on campus, members said.

On many campuses, the name Barb is commonly used to refer to all independent students, men or women.

This has been the custom at the University, but since this usage has declined, the group felt a more meaningful name was necessary, president Doris Eby said.

From Barbarian

The word barb was derived from the word barbarian, which was used by the ancient Greeks to identify all who were not Greeks.

Professional

According to Paul Herman, overall chairman of the event, it is a "professional quality show composed of top talent chosen by competition throughout the Big Eight conference."

The Nebraska Union General Entertainment Committee of which Herman is chairman is sponsoring and coordinating the entire show this year.

Acts from the University include the Mary Anns, Mike Breiner and his guitar, and pianist Terry Moshier.

John West, NU junior will be master of ceremonies.

Other acts include tap dancer Dalano Lewis, singer

of ballads Jim McMullan, Missouri comedy team Flynn, Geotz, and Levine, vocalist Joanne Watkins, magician Gary Richards, and the Co-eds, a quartet from Kansas State.

The first Big Eight Talent Show originated at Kansas State in 1956. In this show Nebraska talent met with talent from Kansas state and Kansas University.

In 1958 the show was expanded to include performances at NU and at Kansas University.

Tickets may be purchased at the Union activities office and from house representatives for 75 cents.

Nebraska acts will leave at 9:00 a.m. Wednesday, play at Kansas U Wednesday night, Kansas State Thursday night, Iowa state Friday night and return with the other acts for the show here Sunday.

Present plans call for the entire show cast to attend the Kansas basketball game Saturday night.
