Rats Grow-Soybean Oil Meal Does the Job

Agriculture from Ainsworth.

Researchers at the University have found that antibiotics when added to a ration of raw soybean oil meal increase growth of rats by 25 per cent

The primary goal was to find something which would equalize the growth rate of rats on raw and cooked soybeans. Since the growth rate varied more from experiment to experiment with raw soybean oil meal, cooked soybean oil meal ration was used as a control.

The addition of small amounts of penicillin and streptomycin, both antibiotics, resulted in approximately equal gains by rats fed raw and cooked soybean oil meal.

Research has indicated that the factor in raw soybeans causing this growth affect is a metabolic inhibitor, which is destroyed by heating
