## Newman Chapel, Center Move Temporarily; New Edifice To Be Built At Present Site

Newmanites attended their last mass Sunday in the yellow wooden building at 1602 Q St. as Newman Club prepares to become the fourth campus religious group to build a new student center in the last nine years.

Razing of the Catholic chapel and student center begins today. Construction of a new brick building replacing the old structure will be started in about two weeks and is expected to be completed by next spring.

### Activities Continue

Until the new building is completed, Newman Club activities will be held at 1112 Q St., approximately five blocks east of the old location.

"We hope all students will come on down to 1112," said Pat Henry, Newman Club

treasurer. "Masses and meetings on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights will be held as usual."

Sunday night suppers are being discontinued until September.

The new building will contain two units, a chapel on the south side of the lot and a student center and priest's home on the north.

### Original Plans

According to Henry, original plans were to build the student center first, then move into it after razing the old building.

Henry said that it was decided over Easter vacation to build both units at once, necessitating the move to 1112 Q St.

The building at 1602 has served approximately 900 stu-

dents since 1952.

Newman Club joins four other religious groups who have built new chapels or student houses recently. The National Lutheran Student House was built in 1952 and a chapel was added to it last November. The Missouri Synod Lutheran Student House and Chapel were completed in 1951, and the Cotner School of Religion, headquarters for the Baptist-Christian Fellowship, in 1954. A chapel was added to the Presbyterian Student House in 1957.

Rush Week at KU might go by a better name. The sorority rushing period lasts five weeks!

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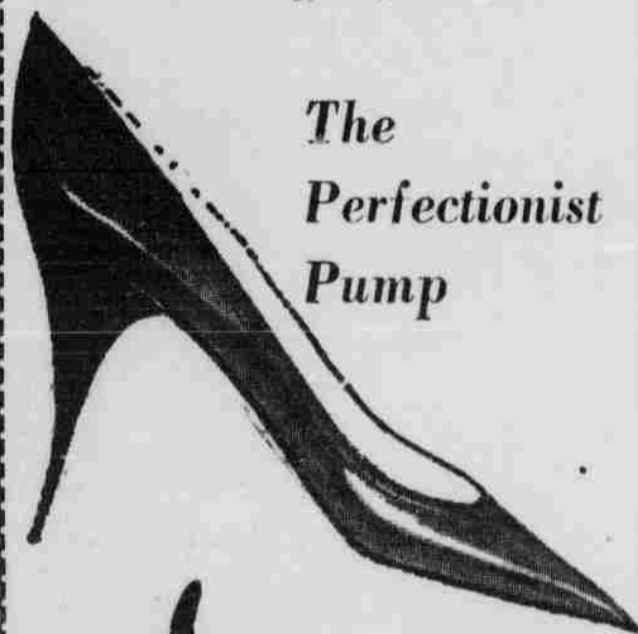
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## Two Frosh Win 4-H DC Trips
