

O-State Winning String Snapped By Five-Hitter

Nebraska handed Oklahoma State its first conference loss of the season, 7-2, Friday but the Cowboys bounced back to take both ends of Saturday's doubleheader, 4-0 and 5-1.

Harry Tolly's five-hit pitching and a game ending triple play by the Huskers highlighted the 7-2 win. Tolly was the master all the way, retiring the Cowpokes in 1, 2, 3 fashion in the 1st, 4th, 7th and 8th frames.

After the 3rd inning, the Husker righthander didn't allow a hit until the 9th when Jim Dobson and Tim Green opened that canto with singles to left field.

Don Soergel, pinch hitting for Grayson Mersch, hit a broken bat bloop over the pitcher's head and Husker second sacker Gil Dunne charged in to catch the ball on the edge of the infield grass.

Triple Play
With the Cowboy runners moving, Dunne tossed the ball to Ken Ruisinger at first for the second out and Ruisinger rifled the ball to Shortstop Dave Murakami at second to complete the triple play and end the ball game.

Trailing 2-1 going into the bottom half of the 6th, the Huskers rallied with three runs to take the lead. LeRoy Zentic started the rally with an infield single. Jerry McKay hit what looked like a double play ball back to the pitcher but Roy Peterson threw the ball into center-field.

Tolly was safe on a fielders choice to load the bases and after Doug Sieler lifted a short fly ball to left field, Gil Dunne drew a walk forcing in the tying run. Murakami singled sharply to left to bring in Semin and Tolly. Semin was running for McKay.

Nebraska added three insurance runs in the 8th-inning. It was Tolly's second win against one loss and was the first loss in six decisions for Cowboy hurler Roy Peterson.

Nebraska was limited to two hits by Oklahoma State chucker Joe Horlen as he breezed to a 4-0 win in the first game of Saturday's doubleheader.

Horlen struck out eight and allowed only four Huskers to

reach base with no on advancing as far as second. Dave Murakami got the first Nebraska hit with a single to center in the 4th but he was cut down when Ruisinger hit into a double play.

Bases Full
Nebraska had the bases full twice with no one out but couldn't score as the Cowpokes took a 5-1 victory in the nightcap of the doubleheader.

The Huskers scored first when Doug Sieler led off in the first inning with a triple and Murakami singled him home. Oklahoma State pitcher Dick Soergel shut the Nebraskans out the rest of the way.

Soergel allowed only four hits and registered 12 strikeouts. Nebraska loaded the bases in the third with no one out but Soergel got Ruisinger to hit into a force play with Sieler being thrown out at home. Soergel then struck out Zentic and Nelson to get out of the jam.

The Huskers loaded the sacks again in the seventh but Soergel struck out Dunne,

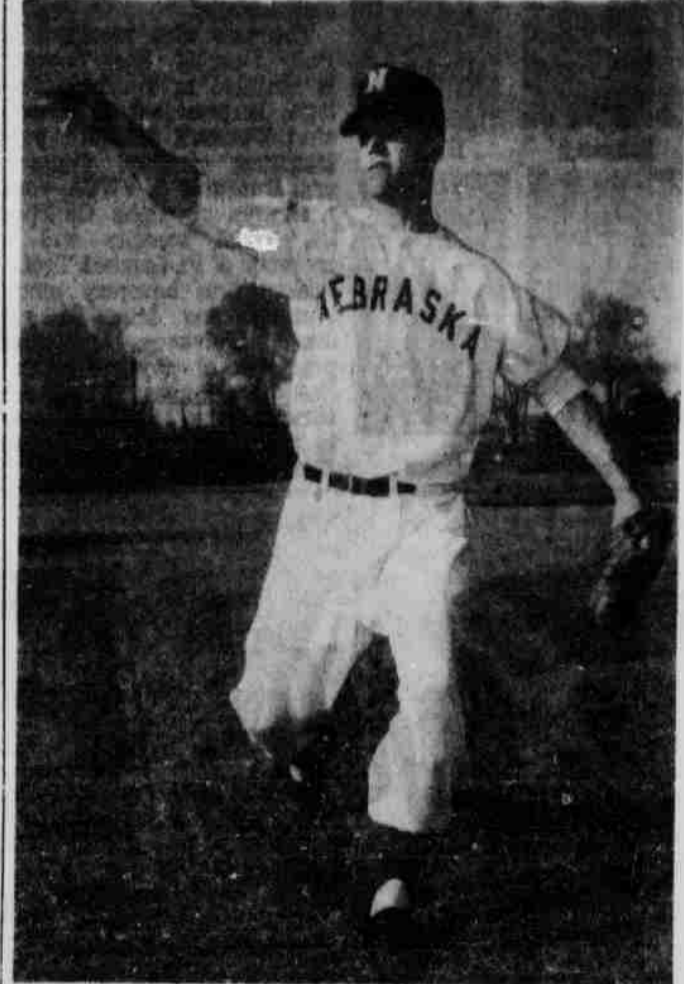

The netters, playing without the services of Bill North blanked Drake 7-0 and dropped a close 5-2 decision to Iowa State. Against the Cyclones, Bruce Russel and Albert Arrigunaga scored wins in the singles department. In another singles match, Roger Barney lost a three set match to Charles Kress of the Cyclones 4-6, 6-3, 6-2. Both doubles matches were tight. Russel and Dave Calhoun lost their match 6-4, 11-9 and Arrigunaga and Bill Kendall dropped their 10-8, 6-1.

The golfers dropped Drake 9 1/2 to 2 1/2 but fell before Iowa State 10 1/2 to 4 1/2. Mike McCuiston was medalist for the Huskers against Iowa State with a 76. Bob Epstein copped medalist honors in the Drake meet with a 74.

Seven Records Set As Buffs Take 76-60 Decision Over NU Thinclad

The Nebraska Thinclads suffered a 76 to 60 setback to Colorado as six meet records and one stadium record was broken at Boulder.

Nebraska broke their own meet record set a year ago in the 440-yd. relay with Ken Pollard, Don House, Dick Jahr and Don Phillips teaming up to win the relay in 42.3 seconds. The old record was 42.4.

Colorado broke the other records. The Buffs' Mike Peake broke his own meet record in the 880-yd. run with a 1:51.2 clocking. He set the old record a year ago at 1:52.5. Joe Mullins of Nebraska was also under the old mark with a second place time of 1:52.3.

Bernie Frakes of Colorado easily outdistanced Husker Joe American Horse in the two-mile run and set a new stadium record at 9:37.2. Frakes is the defending outdoor two-mile champion.

The 220-yd. low hurdles record was broken by Eddie Dove of Colorado with a winning time of 24.2 breaking the old record of 24.3 set by Colorado's Pat Hindman in 1952.

Other records were broken by Colorado in the mile relay, Billy Lewis of Colorado in the high jump and Gene Weil of Colorado in the discus.

First place winners for Nebraska were Don Phillips in the 100-yd. dash, Joe Mullins in the mile, Ken Pollard in the pole vault and Al Wellman in the shot put in addition to the 440-yd. relay.
