NU Gets \$250,000 In Grants

More than a quarter million dollars in research and training grants from the federal government, foundations and industrial groups to the University was reported recently by Dr. John Weaver, research administrator. Weaver said the total for the past year exceeded that of the previous year by \$311,000 and called the increase a tribute to the University's top-caliber faculty, which attracts these funds.

Market Up For Science Reporting

There is an apparent growing market for good science reporting, Howard Allaway, editor of Popular Science Monthly, advised a group of students at a journalism convocation Friday. Allaway cited polls taken in 1957 and 1958 to find out what Americans thought of science reporting.

of the money received from outside sources, 79 per cent came from federal agencies, one per cent from state government and 20 per cent from non-governmental sources such as foundations and industrial groups. Slightly more than two-thirds came from a single federal agency, the U.S. Public Health Service. Weaver noted that in distributing the funds within the University, 59 per cent was received in support of projects at the College of Medicine, 22 per cent in the College of Arts and Sciences and 13 per cent in the College of Agriculture, with the remaining six per cent to the remaining six colleges.
