Ag Campus Toured By Germans

Two German agriculturalists toured the College of Agriculture Tuesday as part of a national tour of agricultural institutions and state governments.

Dr. Theodore Sonneman, deputy minister of agriculture, Federal Ministry of Food Agriculture and Forestry, Bonn, Germany, and Edmund Rehwinkel, senior president, German Farmers Association; vice president, Union Chamber of Commerce and a farmer and two officials make up the delegation making the tour.

The delegation visited the Departments of Agronomy and Agricultural Engineering, Tuesday morning. In the afternoon they visited the state Department of Agriculture and Inspection, the Governor's office and the legislature.

Officials accompanying the agriculturalists are Dr. Wilhelm Schuel, agricultural secretary, German Embassy, Washington, D.C., and Ernest Koenig, agricultural economist and interpreter, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Local School Board Aid Set for Prep TV Classes

Three teachers from the University's high school educational television program for next year will be provided by the Lincoln School Board.

To supplement money from the Fund for the Advancement of Education (a part of Ford Foundation) the Board earlier allocated \$15,000 for studio costs.

Support Lost
Three University representatives, Dr. Knute Broady, Dr. Gayle Childs and Jack McBride, told the Board that the small schools in a 50-mile radius of Lincoln apparently will not lend enough support to permit the program to continue.

Dr. Broady, director, and Dr. Childs are from the Extension Division. McBride is the director of KUON-TV.

Dr. Broady said that of 30 small secondary schools which participated last year, only 15 have indicated interest for the coming year. The coming year will be the first on a cost basis.

Supt. Steven Watkins said Lincoln secondary schools will use the courses, primarily in large classrooms. English, geometry, American history and chemistry or physics are the courses expected to be offered.

Installation Costs
An estimated \$10,000 is needed for the installation of television sets and other equipment in addition to the \$15,000 for studio costs. The use of television will fit well into new education patterns, Dr. Watkins said.

He is chairman of a committee which evaluated educational television in other cities. The Fund for the Advancement of Education will withdraw its supplemental funds next year because "the experiment has established its feasibility," said Dr. Broady.
