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Dent Course For Grads Rescheduled

Postgraduate short courses in dentistry have been scheduled for the 1959-60 school year.

The program is being re-introduced after a lapse of several years.

The five courses of two and three-day periods will cover the fields of oral surgery, preventive orthodontics, periodontics, occlusal equilibration procedures and partial dentures.

The courses, co-sponsored by the College of Dentistry and Extension Division, will provide a "continuing education" for dentists, said Dean Ralph L. Ireland of the College of Dentistry.

Applications have been sent to 4,500 dentists in Nebraska and adjoining states. Other states have been included since there are no dental colleges between the West Coast and Nebraska, Dr. Ireland said.

Occlusal equilibration procedures and partial denture courses will be limited to 10 because of the supervisory nature of the instruction.

Union to Open Picture Library

Two hundred varied pictures, suitable for brightening anyone's room, will be available from the Student Union picture lending library, starting at 8 a.m. Thursday.

They can be checked out free for one semester to students with identification cards.

The library in the basement of the new Union addition will close at 5 p.m., but will open Friday at 8 a.m., to check out remaining pictures.

Paul Johns, chairman of the Arts and Exhibits committee for the Union Board, said this year's collection includes two dozen new pictures. It is made up of copies of old and modern masterpieces and also includes copies of some contemporary originals.
