Geier Begins 10th Season As NU Gymnastics Coach

Jake Geier will begin his tenth season as head gymnastics coach at Nebraska when his Husker squad opens the season with the Midwest Invitational Meet at Chicago Dec. 4 and 5.

In the past nine years, Geier's teams have won 48 of 68 dual matches for a percentage of .706 and nine of 12 triangular matches for a .750 percentage. In the three tri-

angular which the Huskers did not win, they finished second.

Geier's teams have won the All-College Invitational meet six of the last eight years and only once since 1954 have Nebraska's gymnasts finished lower than 19th in the NCAA championships. The high finish was 1954, when Bruce Riley led the Huskers to ninth place.

Geier is optimistic about the upcoming season. "As a team, we should fare as well as last season with the possibility of becoming a bit stronger depending on how our sophomores come along," he says.

"Our strong events will be the side horse and flying rings with good balance in the other events," Geier admitted.

Letterwinners Dennis Anstine and Karl Byers return in the side horse with sophomore Gene Hart and junior Paul Kotsines lending support in that event.

Byers finished fifth in the side horse event at the NCAA championships last year and led the Huskers to a 6-2 dual season record.

"Byers, a two-letter winner from Lincoln, should be one of the top performers in the midwest, and should place high in national competition," said Geier.

Returning lettermen include: Anstine, Hastings junior; Byers; Phil Hall, Beatrice senior; and Herb Hanich, Lincoln junior.

Sophomores being counted on are David Bowers, Gene Hart, Virgil Kubert, Don Lloyd and Dennis Mulligan.

Humiliating Loss to K-State Puts Huskers in 6th Place

Hal Brown Nebraska's unpredictable gridgers ended the 1959 season on a low note as Kansas State won their second game of the season with a 29-14 triumph over the Huskers.

It was the most points scored by the Wildcats this year and broke a seven-game losing streak for them. Kansas State was able to score only 23 points against tiny South Dakota State.

Busby's Wildcats defeated South Dakota State 26-12 in the second game of the season for their only win until the Nebraska game. K-State had lost their last seven games and hadn't scored in their last four prior to Saturday.

They had been shut out by Iowa State 26-0, Iowa 53-0, Oklahoma 27-0 and Missouri 26-0. But the Wildcats encountered little trouble in reaching paydirt against Nebraska as they scored by every possible method.

Kansas State's 29 points came on 10 touchdowns, three extra point kicks, two field goals and a safety.

The Buffs eliminated the Orange Bowl picture. But Saturday

was a different story as the Huskers had just as much reason for wanting a win as Kansas State.

A Nebraska victory would have given them a 3-3 record in the conference and a 5-5 mark overall. They would have given the Big Eight for third place standing.

Nebraska fired right back and was threatening to score again when the Wildcats' John Solomos pirated a Tolly pass on the K State 11-yard line.

One of the few good performances turned in by a Nebraskan was that of Carroll "Pappy" Zaruba. He finished his college football career in fine style. He gained 126 yards in 18 carries for an average of 7.0 yards per carry.

Zaruba set up the first Nebraska touchdown with a 30-yard run. He scored the second a 20-yard gallop.

Early Score Nebraska needed only five plays to score after taking the opening kickoff. After losing four yards on the first two plays, Zaruba, running from the fullback slot broke through the line and raced 66 yards before being hauled down from behind by Dale Evans, a K-State trackster, on the eight-yard line.

After Clay White gained five yards, Dallas Dyer went over from the line for the score. Ron Meade added the extra point to make it 7-0. Following an exchange of punts, Kansas State moved from their own 39 to a first and ten situation on the Nebraska 12-yard line where the Husker defense stiffened and took the ball on downs at the three-yard line.

Harry Tolly put a third

down for Nebraska and after being from the Nebraska 42 to the 29, K-State's John Meade booted a field goal from the 35-yard line just before the first quarter ended.

Nebraska fired right back and was threatening to score again when the Wildcats' John Solomos pirated a Tolly pass on the K State 11-yard line.

The Wildcats stayed mainly on the ground as they advanced 85 yards for the touchdown to put them ahead. They threw only two passes in the 20 plays they used to score with the final play being a pass from Ron Blaylock to Evans covering seven yards.

French added the extra point to make it 10-7 in favor of Kansas State at halftime. Nebraska scored on three plays the first time they got their hands on the ball after intermission. Blaylock punted out of bounds on the Kansas State 41 and after White was stopped with no gain, Tolly picked up 21 yards.

Zaruba then carried the

pigskin into the end zone for the final Husker touchdown of the day and the season. Meade added his ninth extra point of the season in 12 attempts to give Nebraska the lead 14-10.

From here on, it was all Kansas State as Nebraska failed to penetrate Wildcat territory the remainder of the ball game.

Kansas State scored two more touchdowns on a one-yard plunge by Max Falk and a 20-yard pass play from Blaylock to Evans with French adding the extra points.

The Wildcats trapped Tolly in the end zone for a safety as the Husker quarterback attempted to pass. French completed the scoring with his second field goal of the afternoon, this one from the 27 yard line.

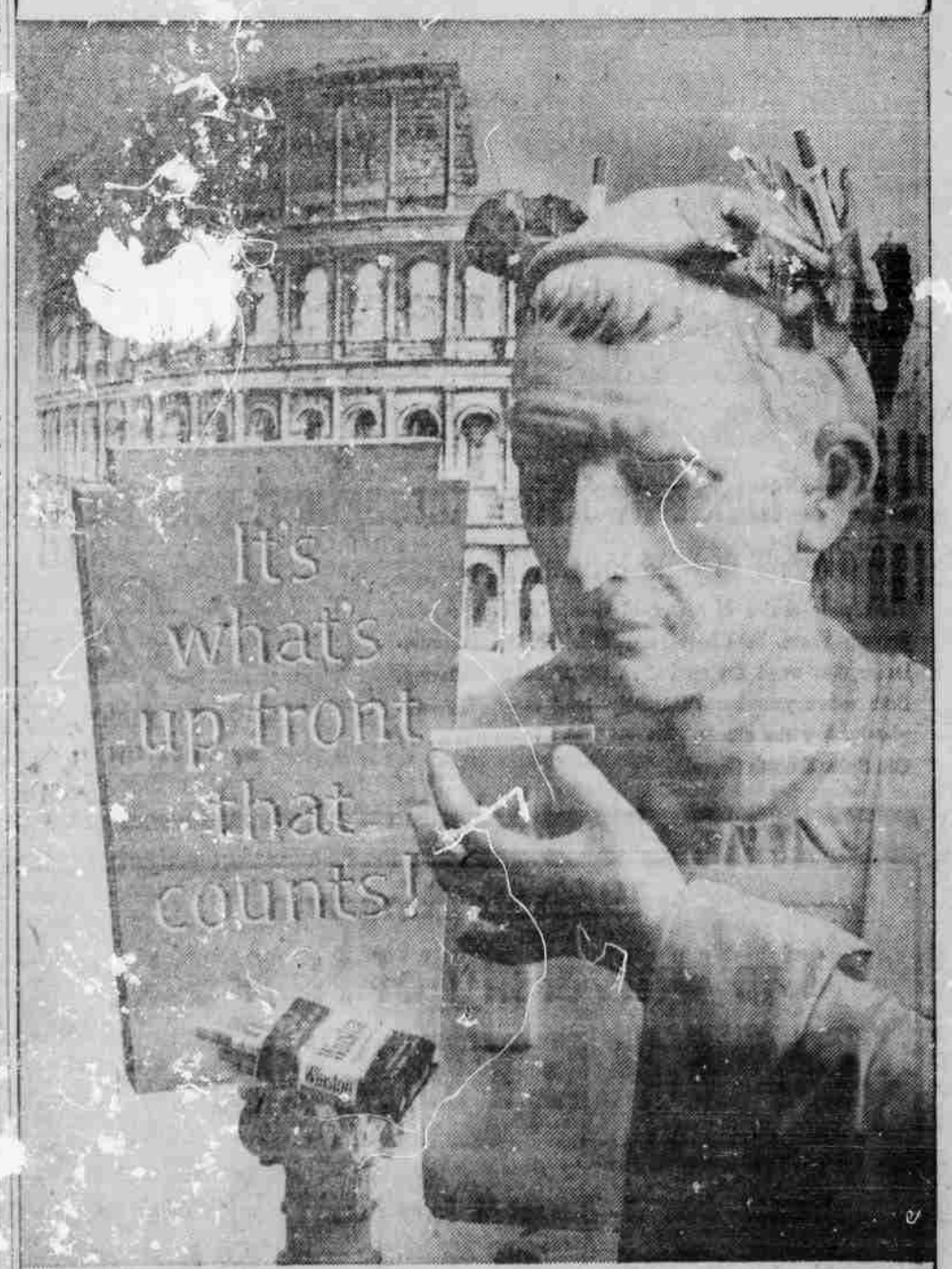
