

Husker Quintet Suffers Defeat 70-62

Irish Extend String to Four; NU Streak Stopped at Three

The Nebraska hoopsters suffered their first setback in four starts this season when they lost to a big, rugged Notre Dame five 70-62 Monday night at the Coliseum.

The Husker quintet could not overcome the height advantage of the Irish furnished by Mike Graney (6-5), John Tully (6-7) and John Dearie (6-6) as Notre Dame controlled both boards.

Fourth Straight Nebraska had won their first three games over Stewart Air Force Base, the Air Force Academy and Minnesota before last night's game. The victory leaves Johnny Jordan's Irish with a 5-1 record. It was the fourth consecutive win for Notre Dame since a 61-57 loss to Michigan State in an overtime battle.

The Irish own victories over Western Illinois, Wisconsin, Northwestern, the Air Force Academy and now Nebraska. Nebraska trailed 35-29 at the halftime break but fought back to tie the score at 46-46 with 12:19 left in the game. With the Huskers trailing 46-40, Bob Harry made two free throws, Jim Kowalke added another, Hersh Turner scored on a twisting jump shot and then Al Maxey knotted the score with a free throw.

This was the last time Nebraska was tied with the Irish as they fired back with

four consecutive field goals to take a 54-46 margin and the Huskers never caught them.

Emmett McCarthy, a hard-driving senior, hit two driving lay-ins and Graney and Bob Bradtke scored on jump shots to give the Irish the lead again.

The closest the Husker quintet got after that point was within five points at 56-61 when Harry hit a jump shot, Maxey added a lay-in and was fouled. He made the free throw and then Al Roots added two more gift tosses while Notre Dame was held scoreless.

Nebraska never trailed until the final eight minutes of the first half. Kowalke got the Huskers rolling early with a jump shot for the first score of the game and after Tully scored on a hook shot for Notre Dame, Jerry Bush's crew raced to an 8-2 lead on jump shots by Turner and

Kowalke and a lay-in by Turner.

It was the last field goal for Turner in the first half as he was held to five points in each half. The biggest lead of the evening for Nebraska was at 20-12 midway in the first half.

Trailing by that margin, Notre Dame came striking back with seven straight points while Nebraska was held scoreless. Graney started the rally for the Irish with a lay-in.

McCarthy, who was a thorn in the Husker side all night, then scored on a driving lay-in and was fouled. He made the free throw and then Dearie, a 210-pound sophomore from New York, tipped one in to pull Notre Dame to within one point at 20-19.

Irish Lead

After Maxey hit a free throw, McCarthy came back with a charity bucket and Graney scored on a twisting jump shot to give the Irish the lead at 22-21.

Notre Dame took the lead for good near the end of the first half on two consecutive jump shots by McCarthy to give them a 29-27 margin and the Huskers never regained the lead.

Notre Dame stalled the final three and one-half minutes of the game as the Hus-

kers were forced to foul in an effort to gain possession of the ball.

Kowalke scored 17 points on eight field goals and one for one at the free throw line to lead the Husker scoring. Maxey and Turner also scored in double figures with 11 and 10 points respectively, both season lows for the duo.

Graney led all scorers for the evening with 19 points. McCarthy added 15 while Bradtke and Crosby contributed 11 and 10 respectively to the Irish victory.

Notre Dame outscored Nebraska from the field 27-24 and from the charity stripe 16-14 although the Huskers had a better percentage from the free throw line. Nebraska made 14 of 20 free throw attempts for 70 percent while the Irish made 16 of 27 for 59 percent.

The Huskers host Michigan State at 8:05 p.m. Thursday before leaving on a western road trip that will take them to Oregon and Montana.

Nebraska Swimmers Finish Second in Jayhawk Relays

Nebraska's swimmers opened the 1959-'60 season Saturday with a second place finish in the First Annual Jayhawk Relays at Lawrence, Kan.

Kansas was the winner with 80 points and Nebraska trailed with 46 followed by Colorado with 24 and Kansas State with 20.

All events were relays with Nebraska winning one, the diving relay. The Huskers had four second place finishes, two thirds and two fourths.

"I was pleasantly surprised with the performance of the boys," commented swimming coach Dick Klaas. "They did better than I had expected."

Branch Walton and Jim Frank teamed up in the diving relay to give the Huskers their only first place finish. Walton and Frank finished ahead of Colorado with 227.4 points to 157.8 points.

Kansas, the host school, won all other events to rack up their total of 80 points. Kansas with Jeff Goodell, Eldon Ward, Jared Piety and

Edward Poort easily outdistanced Kansas State to win the 400-yard freestyle relay. Kansas' winning time was 3:38.7 with Kansas State finishing second with a 3:53.4 clocking.

Colorado edged Nebraska for third with a time of 4:50.1 to the Huskers 4:50.2.

Huskers Second The Jayhawks won the 400-yard backstroke relay with a 4:18.0 clocking and Nebraska was second with a time of 4:30.5. The Huskers with Don Benson, Myron Papadakis, Joe Stocker and Larry McClean finished second to Kansas in the 400-yard breaststroke and butterfly relay. Nebraska's time of 4:44.0 was 16 seconds behind the Jayhawks.

Raschke Is Lone NU Mat Winner

Nebraska Loses To OU and OSU

Heavyweight Jim Raschke was the only Nebraska grappler to score a victory as the Huskers opened the mat season with losses to Oklahoma and Oklahoma State over the weekend.

Raschke saved the Huskers from a shutout against the Sooners with a 6-5 decision over Oklahoma's Dale Lewis. Raschke gave defending NCAA heavyweight champion Ted Ellis of Oklahoma State a scare before losing an 8-5 decision.

Raschke and Jim Faimon were the only Nebraskans escaping pins against Oklahoma as Faimon lost a 6-0 decision to Lawrence Gregory in the 147-pound class.

Four Huskers were pinned by Oklahoma State grapplers. Ted Rethmeier 123, Phil Johnson 130, Jim Faimon 147, and Gene Tice 157 suffered pins at the hands of Cowboy wrestlers.
