Four Series To Premiere Next Week

Four new educational television series will premiere on KUON-TV next week along with a fifth documentary which is returning to the program schedule.

A sixth feature, a special "Dance" program will be presented Jan. 15, at 8 p.m. The program will include modern dance selections by Orchesis, University dance group.

"From Bach to Gershwin with Audun Ravnan" will begin Monday at 8 p.m. Prof. Ravnan of the University's department of music will be at the piano, and Larry Lusk, also a member of the music faculty, will participate in a series of six programs surveying piano literature from the time of Bach to the contemporary mood of Gershwin.

Jazz pianist and composer George Shearing and Father Norman J. O'Connor, Catholic chaplain at Boston University, are the principals in a special nightly feature, "Jazz Meets the Classics" beginning Monday at 9:30 p.m.

The sessions aim to show that the theory and technique of both jazz and classic forms are the same though the handling, treatment and emphasis are different. The George Shearing Quintet is featured.

A new Educational Television series dealing with the sense of values of the American people according to how these values affect living will begin Jan. 12 at 8:30 p.m.

Interviews are based on the assumption that culture is an important factor in determining behavior and that culture stems from a people's sense of what is desirable, good or right.

"Action at Law," a documentary-drama on the trial of a civil lawsuit, returns to Channel 12 on Tuesday and Thursday beginning Jan. 12 at 9 p.m.

This series is based on an actual automobile injury case which was tried in the St. Louis Circuit Court.

Man's attempt to control nature and nature's "Equation of Nature" series that will begin Jan. 13 at 8:30 p.m.

Host for the series will be Dr. John Wehing, extension plant pathologist at the University.

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Faculty To Give Union Art Show

The reason is because they were used to promote candidates and to provide gimmicks for campaigning in contests.

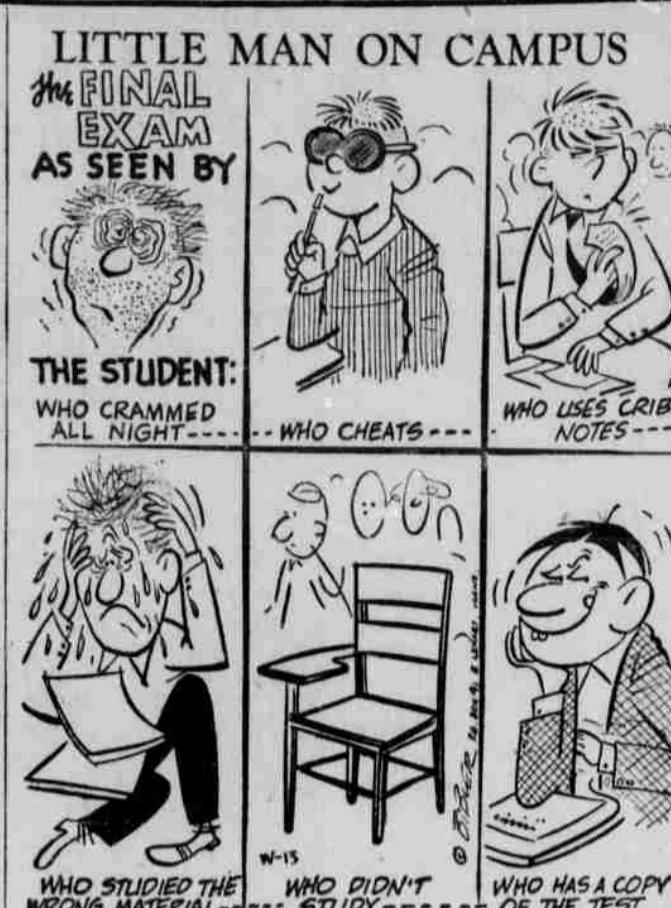
KUON Offers College Credit History Course

The course covers the early exploration of Nebraska as well as the political, economic and social development from 1854 to the present.

The History of Nebraska series will be included in Channel 12's evening schedule effective in February. The total cost of enrollment is \$30.

University Young Republicans will attend the \$50-a-plate fund-raising dinner honoring Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona in Omaha Jan. 26 at reduced rates.

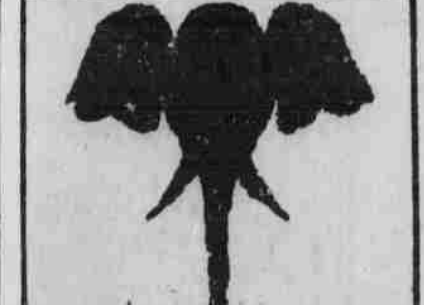


Dear Puzzled: Go to bed a few minutes earlier.
