Higginbotham who has set up headquarters in the Coliseum, had divided his practice sessions between fundamental training.

Two Courts
Although the two courts set in the Coliseum are crowded, there is enough room for adequate practice.

On Monday, Wednesday and Friday the team plays matches for "ladder" positions. During the remainder of the week, specific techniques are studied and practiced.

Coach Higginbotham's team boasts only two returning lettermen from last year's squad. Al Arrigunaga and Bill Kendall last year's monogram winners, are currently holding down number one and two positions, respectively.

Three returning squad members, Dick Newman, Jack Craft and Dave Calhoun, two sophomores, John Nasi and Tom Johnson and transfer student Stan Kruschwitz are all battling for the remaining positions on the 5 member traveling squad.

The netters will swing into action during the weekend of April 1 and 2. The Huskers will host Wichita University on Friday and will play Creighton University on Saturday. Both matches will be played here.

A match April 8 with Creighton will be the dress rehearsal for the team's southern trip. The trip, taken during Spring Vacation will be to Kansas and Oklahoma.

Badminton action starts soon and will feature six singles and doubles tournaments. Courts are now available for practice in the Physical Education Building.

The defending Badminton Champs are Beta Theta Pi (Fraternity) and Gus I (Selleck). Last year's singles title went to Andy Matison, Theta Xi and Bob Soucek and Gary Axsamit of the Betas took the doubles crown.

Softball starts April 4, weather permitting. Entries are due today in 102 PE Building, not later than 5 p.m.

The diamond men will play six inning games and competition will be held in three tours, Interfraternity, Independent and Resident Halls (Burr and Selleck).

Last year Manatt copped the Selleck title and went on to sweep the All-University Tourney. Dental College won the Independents crown, Theta Xi was the Fraternity top-spotters and the Burr Champ was Vm Es.

Each team must furnish an umpire and regular softball rules will apply. Six players must be ready for play and spiked shoes are banned.

There will be an important Softball Manager's meeting Mar. 31, at 5:00 p.m. in 114 PE Building.

The 1960 Horse Shoe Tourney will be single elimination with competition in doubles only. Each organization may enter six doubles teams.

With action beginning April 4, deadline for entering is today in 102 PE Building.

Intramural netters start play in early April in the 1960 Spring Tennis Doubles Tourney.

Each organization may be represented by six teams. There will be separate flights for Fraternity, Resident Halls and Independent entries, with the winners clashing for the All-University Championship.

Beta Theta Pi won last year's Fraternity division, Gus I ruled in Selleck and the Chemists copped the Independent title. Individual doubles champs were Galen Salzman and Stan Kruschwitz.

Deadline for entering is April 5.

April 23 will be the date and Pioneers Golf Course the place for the Intramural Spring Golf Tourney, team and individual championships.

Fraternity, Resident Halls and Independents' competition is slated and back to defend their titles will be Phi Kappa Psi (Fraternity) and Dental College (Independents). Gene Johnson of Delta Tau Delta was last year's individual champ.

Weight lifting starts April 25 and will be held in the Coliseum Weight Room.

Currently underway are two tourneys, volleyball and paddle ball. Thirty teams are left in the double-elimination volleyball tourney. The tourney consists of two Fraternity divisions, two Bull-Selleck divisions and one Independent division.

Undefeated teams include Sigma Phi Epsilon and Theta Xi in Division I, Beta Sigma Psi and Pioneer in Division II, Selleck and Boucher in Division III, Fairfield and Canfield (who played last night) in Division IV and the Iranians, who have already won the Division V Independent Crown.

SHEINWOLD ON BRIDGE

People used to wonder what would happen if an irresistible force met an immovable object, but you'd never catch a good bridge player wasting his brains on that sort of question. When there's an irresistible force anywhere in the neighborhood, the bridge expert just looks for a way to dodge.

South dealer

East won the first trick with the king of diamonds and then led the ace of diamonds. South ruffed and led a trump to dummy's king.

When West discarded a heart on the first round of trumps South detected an irresistible force just a few inches away from his right ear. There was no way to stop East from winning two trump tricks.

South could avoid the loss of a club trick only by skillful dodging. It isn't easy to see the right line of play, so

you might have some fun looking for it before you read on.

Ruffs Diamond
South began by ruffing another diamond. Then he took three rounds of hearts, cashed the top clubs, and led dummy's last diamond.

By this time East was reduced to three trumps and the queen of clubs. South had three trumps and a low club.

If East ruffed, South would dodge by discarding his losing club. East would get his two trumps, but would not get a club trick.

If East discarded the queen of clubs instead of ruffing, South would ruff dummy's diamond. That would be his ninth trick, and the ace of trumps would supply the tenth. East would get his two trump tricks, but he'd capture South's losing club with one of the top trumps.

Either way, South's contract was assured.

Daily Question

Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: spade None, heart 7 5 4 2 diamond Q 9 7 6 2 club 10 9 7 2. What do you say?

Answer: Pass. There is no safe way to rescue your partner when your own hand is so hopeless. In the long run you will lose less if you pass with such hands. If your partner is doubled, and the double is passed for penalties, bid 1 NT as the beginning of a rescue operation.
