Union Main Desk:

Cigarettes Sold But Information Given, Too

"Cigarettes and tobacco... tobacco and cigarettes!" This is the observation many people make on seeing the stacks and racks and piles of brightly colored packages around the Student Union's main desk.

According to Union Operations Manager, W. S. Stockton, however, the primary purpose of this desk is not the selling of commodities, but rather an "information desk for all Union activities and business."

North Entrance The main desk, which is located inside the north entrance and in front of the Crib, is open from 7:30 a.m. until closing everyday except Sunday when it opens at 2 p.m.

The desk should have information concerning all activities both in the Union and on campus of general interest.

"The desk could answer many more questions concerning these activities if the various organizations and groups would inform the main desk before hand," said Stockton.

The desk also has on hand all the keys for every meeting room and for the offices within the Union itself, according to Stockton. These keys may be checked out at anytime from the attendant on duty at the desk.

Sound System A special function of the main desk is the control of the Union's entire sound system. Through this sound system the desk can page a person in any area of the Union, including, meeting rooms and party rooms.

"We prefer to page only those people who are known to be in a certain area or room," commented Stockton. "Also an attempt is being made to set up some kind of restriction on the circumstances when the desk will page."

The sound system can also be used to program recordings, tapes, etc., from the Union's music room to any meeting or party area.

Another important service the Union desk performs is the cashing of checks. The desk can and will cash a check written on any bank as long as the student's IBM number is written on the check.

"The Union does set a limit

for the amount of checks that can be cashed during a day," said the Operations Manager. "Money reserved especially for the cashing of checks is brought to the desk at 8 a.m. and again at 5 p.m. When this money is gone, no more checks will be cashed."

Located at the desk are the mail boxes for those organizations which do not have specific offices on campus and the Union Lost and Found.

"The Union keeps lost articles for 30 days past the end of a semester," said Stockton, "at which time they are shipped over to University Lost and Found."

The attendant at the desk also fills the function of a switchboard operator by receiving all incoming calls to the Union and channeling them to the proper office.

Besides all of these services performed by the main desk, it also takes over the administrative duties when the Union office closes at 5 p.m.

"Any request for service or the setting up of meeting rooms should be made at the desk in the evening," said Stockton. "Also any ideas for what commodities should be

sold at the main desk are welcome. Particular in the way of unique items for the Union and campus."
