Lead Low Trump The correct way to handle the trumps is to lead a low trump first. Win the first heart trick in either hand and just lead a low trump from one hand, playing a low trump from the other hand.

And this is the whole idea. You want to draw exactly two rounds of trumps before you proceed with the rest of the play. You want to make sure that nobody can draw a third trump.

The rest is easy. You cash your high cards in the side suits and cross-ruff. That is, you ruff clubs in the dummy and diamonds in your own hand. It's a cinch to make ten tricks this way.

Student Council Constitution Changes

(Ed. Note—listed below are the recent changes made to the Constitution of the Student Council. Only changes which were made are listed. Other parts of the constitution remain unchanged.)

- Section 3. Exemptions: The following organizations shall be exempt from Section 1 and Section 2 of this article: Interfraternity Council, Panhellenic Council, and Nebraska Union. These organizations shall be served only in a liaison capacity. Article III Powers Article IV Representation A. College Representatives 1. The colleges listed herein shall be entitled to representatives: a. Agriculture (at least one man and one woman) b. Arts and Sciences (at least one man and one woman) c. Business Administration d. Dentistry e. Engineering and Architecture f. Law g. Pharmacy h. Teachers (at least one man and one woman) 2. The college representatives shall be determined by the Student Council on the basis of one representative for every 200 students or major portion thereof as determined by the first semester enrollment of the respective academic year of election. Each college herein represented shall be entitled to a minimum of one representative. 3. The college representatives shall be elected at the Spring general election. 4. In the case of a vacancy in college representation, the replacement shall be elected by the Student Council from those who have submitted written applications for the position. This replacement must be of the same sex. In those colleges in which a ratio is specified, and meet all regular college and representative requirements. B. Organization and Group Representatives 1. Each organization or group listed herein shall be entitled to one representative. a. Associated Women's Student Board b. Churn Club c. Independent Women's Association d. Interfraternity Council e. Intra-Campus Council f. Nebraska Union Board of Managers g. Panhellenic Council h. Y.W.C.A. i. Y.W.O.B. j. University of Nebraska Builder's Board k. University of Nebraska Council on Religion l. Forestry Students 2. These representatives shall be elected in the Spring of the year by secret ballot. 3. In case the representative elected by an organization or group gives up his Student Council membership because of withdrawal from school, resignation or inability, the organization shall hold another election at its first regular scheduled meeting after the vacancy is announced to replace the representative. The election of the replacement shall be governed by the rules previously specified for the election of organization or group representatives. 4. Inactive organizations or groups shall be deprived of representation on the Student Council. C. Senior Representatives 2. In case a senior holdover member withdraws from school, resigns, or becomes ineligible, that vacancy shall not be filled. Article V Eligibility, Filings, Etc. Section 1. Senior Holdover d. Each member shall have a minimum cumulative average of five point seven (5.7). Section 2. College Filings a. Filings for college representatives are open to students who will be eligible to serve during their sophomore and/or junior years. b. Applications of college representatives for election to the Student Council shall be filed in the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs. The second vice-president of the Student Council shall submit to the Daily Nebraskan the period for filing. This notice shall be given at least ten days prior to the day upon which filings open. Section 3. Organization Filings a. The organization and group representatives shall be elected to serve during their junior year with the following exception. The Nebraska Union Board of Managers representative shall be elected to serve during either his junior or senior year. b. The organization and group representative shall be present at an organization and group election to supervise the balloting. The ballots for each organization and group election for Student Council representatives shall be sealed in an envelope and submitted to the Student Council Election Committee for tabulation and announcement. c. The organization or group representative shall not have had previous service on the Student Council. Section 4. Publicity and Campaigning a. Publicity other than that prescribed in the constitution or by-laws shall not be permitted.

NBC Executive To Speak During 'J-Week' Festivities

Edward Stanley, director of public affairs for NBC, will be the featured speaker during "Journalism Week" which began Sunday and will continue until May 20 this year.

Stanley, a 1926 graduate of the Nebraska School of Journalism, will speak at a convocation in the Union May 13 and at the annual Journalism Banquet May 14. Kickoff for the school's observance this year was an Open House Sunday at Dr. and Mrs. William E. Hall's residence for School of Journalism seniors, parents and faculty.

Another feature of the lengthened "J-week" will be the Silver Key Luncheon next Saturday in the Union. Silver Keys will be awarded to the top 15 high school journalists and certificates will go to the next 30 outstanding high schoolers. Jim Raglin, state editor of the Lincoln Journalist will speak.

A breakfast and pledging for Theta Sigma Phi, women's professional journalism fraternity, will also be held Saturday in the Union and initiation for Kappa Tau Alpha, journalism scholastic honorary will be Sunday at the Lindell Hotel.
