The morning workout was scheduled to avoid conflict with the baseball game and track meet in the afternoon. Nebraska has one practice session remaining after Saturday's workout but it may be skipped depending on the practices the remainder of this week. The coaching staff faces three problems as the drills come to a close. The problems center around the quarterback and end positions and punting. "It will be hard to match Harry Tolly's record as a kicker," Jennings said. "Naturally we hope that we can move the ball so that we will not have to kick so often." Tolly punted 53 times last season for an average of 36.4 yards.

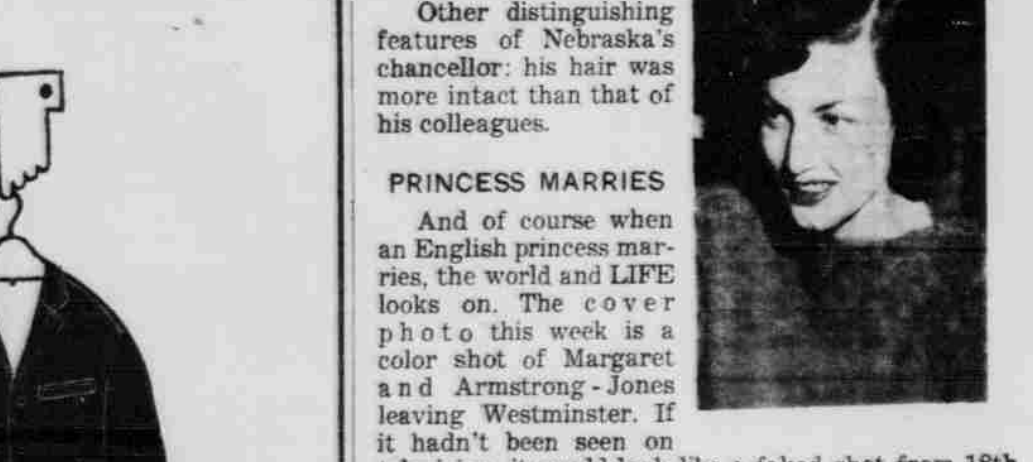
