

Tolly, Wall Hurl Five-hitters To Snap NU Losing Streak

Nebraska got two good pitching performances from Harry Tolly and Jan Wall in winning two of three games from Kansas Friday and Saturday.

The Huskers broke an eleven game losing streak behind the five-hit pitching of Tolly in the second game of Friday's doubleheader winning by a 4-1 count. Wall gave up only five hits in 8 2-3 innings as the Huskers made it two in a row with an 11-1 win Saturday.

After dropping the twinbill opener to the Jayhaws 10-8 in nine innings, two more than the scheduled seven, Nebraska coach Tony Sharpe revamped his lineup for the second game. Sharpe benched several of his regulars for what he called, "lackadaisical play."

Tolly was in trouble in every inning except the fourth as seven errors gave the Jayhaws numerous oppor-

tunities to score but the senior righthander came through when the chips were down. He struck out 13 and walked only two in winning his third game against the same number of losses.

Score In First Nebraska opened the scoring in the first inning when Jerry Harris singled, moved to third on a single by Phil Barth and romped home on a one-base blow by Dick Becher.

After Kansas knotted the count at one-all in the fourth, the Huskers came battling back with a three-run fifth inning. Doug Siler opened the fifth with a triple, and scored on a single by Jerry Harris who moved to third when Bob Semin singled.

Harris scored on a sacrifice fly by Becher and Semin came home on Elmer Takeishis's base blow.

Sharpe juggled the lineup again for Saturday's single game and the Huskers came through with a resounding 11-1 triumph to move one-half game ahead of the Jayhaws in the loop standings.

Nebraska has a 5-9 conference record for sixth place while Kansas is in seventh place with a 5-10 record.

Shutout Spoiled Wall shut out the Jayhaws until two were out in the ninth when John Tonge doubled off the tall righthander sending Ken Hensley home with the only Kansas run of the game.

Tolly came in after Tonge doubled and retired Jim Tally on a fly ball to centerfield to end the game. It was Tolly's final home appearance as a Nebraska athlete.

Nebraska scored two runs in the third on only one hit and added another one in the fourth on a double steal with Don Purcell racing home. Ely Churchich's solo homer in the sixth frame made the

score 4-0 and then the Huskers broke loose for seven runs in the seventh inning.

Six runs in the big seventh were scored after two were out with the big blow being Churchich's second four-bagger of the day, this time with two runners on base.

Shortstop Bill Redmond making only his second start as a Husker had a perfect day with four hits in four trips to the play and made some outstanding plays at his shortstop position.

Wall, showing no signs of the back trouble that had kept him sidelined all week, was the winner. He struck out six and walked two in picking up his fourth win

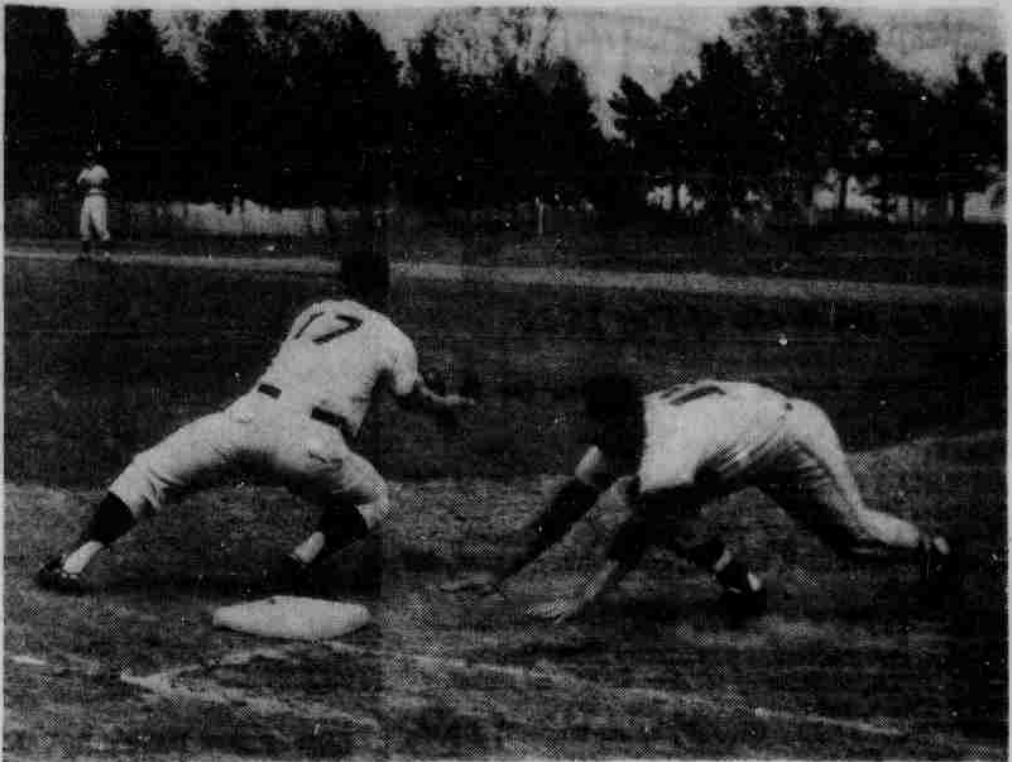
against four losses.

Game Tied

In the first game of the series, the two teams were tied at three-all after the regulation seven innings. Kansas took a two run lead in the top half of the eighth but the Huskers came back to knot the score on Siler's two-run single with two out.

The Jayhaws scored five times in the ninth and a three-run Nebraska rally in the bottom half of that frame fell short as the Huskers went down to their eleventh straight loss.

The Huskers travel to Oklahoma Friday and Saturday for the final games of the season.

Colorado Edges Huskers As Six Records Tumble

The Colorado Buffaloes edged out Nebraska's tracksters 73 1/2-62 1/2 in a dual meet closing out the season. Six records were broken, two by Nebraska and four by Colorado.

Nebraska's Al Wellman sailed the disc 153-6 1/2 to break the old record of 152-8, second with a toss of 153-1 to also top the old mark. Joe Mullins broke the mile record of 4:20 when he edged out Joe American Horse in the last 50 yards for a clocking of 4:19.1. Mullins was NU's only double winner with the other coming in the 880 in 1:53.

Relay Record Shattered Colorado's mile relay team of John Shultz, Ralph Poucher, Jim Heath, and Teddy Woods ran this event in 3:17.9 shattering the old record of 3:22.3. Husker anchorman Mullins gave Buff anchor Woods a run for his money. Woods and Mullins ran side by side most of the way with one or the other pulling slightly ahead at times. In the last stride Woods pulled ahead to nose out Mullins.

Nebraska swept the 120-high hurdles, the 880-yard run, and the mile. Milt Haedt copped first in the 120-highs :14.9 with Bill Fasano and third respectively. In the 880 and mile Mullins took first with Ken Ash and Rich Kier nabbing second and third respectively in the 880 and American Horse and

Jerry Marples placing second and third in the mile.

LeRoy Keane won a blue ribbon as he skimmed the 220-lows in :24.4, one-tenth of a second off the dual mark.

Broad Jumps 25 Feet Colorado's other records were in the broad jump by Don Meyers with a tremendous leap of 25 feet, bettering the old record by 1-3/4; in the javelin when Dick Clark hurled the spear 222-5 1/2 to knock out the old record by 26-6; and in the 2-mile when Bernie Frakes stepped it off in 9:19 to topple his own mark of 9:30.5.

Teddy Woods and Don Meyers were CU's double winners. Woods grabbed firsts in the 100 and 220-yard dashes, and Meyers' came in the broad jump and a three way tie for first in the pole vault, 13-6.

Jim Kraft, Husker vaulter, and Buff Roger Olander tied for first with Meyers in the pole vault. As added attractions 3 special events featuring freshmen were run. Ernie Gunter won the 120-highs in :14.7 and the 220-yard dash in :22.3. The special 880 was won by John Silvera in 1:55.3. May 20-21 the Husker thin-clads travel to Ames, Iowa, for the Big Eight Outdoor Conference Meet.
