

Huskers First Football Unit Has 4 Returning Regulars

Only four regulars from last year's grid team are listed on the first unit at the end of spring drills at Nebraska. The Huskers ended drills Monday.

Left tackle George Haney, right tackle Roland McDole, right end Don Purcell and Don Fricke, moved back from fullback to center are the only regulars listed with the first unit.

Rounding out the number one team are left end Jim Hoge, left guard Al Fischer, right guard Gary Toogood, quarterback Ron Meade, left halfback Pat Clare, right halfback Warren Powers and fullback Noel Martin.

All were members of last year's squad with the exception of Toogood. Meade saw very little action, being used mainly as a place-kicker, but was very impressive in the Alumni-Varsity game this spring.

Meade displayed good judgment in mixing up his plays and also connected on six of 10 passes with sophomore fullback Thunder

Thornton on the receiving end of most of his tosses.

The second unit listed by Coach Bill Jennings includes Jim MacDonald, left end; Dick Krause, left tackle; Darrell Cooper, left guard;

Mick Tinglehoff, center; Tyrone Robertson, right guard; Bob Jones, right tackle and Bill Comstock, right end.

The second team backfield quarterback, Bernie Clay, left half; Gene Ward, right

half and Thunder Thornton at fullback.

Completing the three-deep lineup are: Larry Donovan, left end; Monte Kiffin, left tackle; John Pontigo, left guard; Larry Krause, center; Dick Koler, right guard; Al Wellman, right tackle; Pat Salerno, right end.

Dennis Claridge is calling signals for the third unit with Bennie Dillard at left half, Clay White at right half and Steve Olen rounding out the backfield at fullback.

The Huskers open the 1960 season Sept. 17 against Texas at Austin and then open the home season the following week with Minnesota providing the opposition.

Hohn Wins Pentathlon 2nd Time

Columbus Cops Team Crown

Bob Hohn of Beatrice broke his own record in the 120-yard high hurdles en route to the Nebraska pentathlon crown for the second straight year.

Hohn topped the tall timbers in :14.2 to break his previous record of :14.6 set in 1959.

Columbus was the grand champion as 12 teams and 56 individuals competed in this annual event established by the late Henry Schulte in 1921.

Ted Englebart of Columbus set the only other record when he spun the discus 175 feet to top the old mark held by Howard Debus of Lincoln High at 174-2 1/2 established in 1940.

O'Neill won the Class B crown with David City St. Mary's copping the C title and Polk coming out on top in Class D.

Holy Name Star Chuck Sladovnik Picks Nebraska

Charles Sladovnik, Omaha Holy Name's outstanding basketball player and named as an All-State player, will attend Nebraska next fall, Coach Jerry Bush announced. "We are elated that Chuck has chosen Nebraska as his school," Coach Bush said. "He has all the shots, hooks, drive-ins and jumps. He had many offers to attend other schools but chose his own state university." Sladovnik is 6-4 and weighs 190.

Six Are Nominated For IM Presentation

Five more athletes have been nominated for the Daily Nebraskan's Outstanding Intramural Athlete for 1959-1960. Bob Eyth, Dean Prazak, Myron Papadakis, Steve Smith and Don Wenzel join previously nominated Bob Prokop in the race for the top intramural participant.

Prazak, last year a member of the Nebraska basketball team, is a member of Delta Delta Upsilon fraternity. He has only been active in intramurals last spring and all of this year but has been outstanding in them.

The nominating letter says, "A guard on D. U.'s basketball team, he was consistently high scorer and leading defensibleman. He held down shortstop on the runnerup softball team, ending the season with no errors and one of the high batting averages.

Next is Papadakis, Delta Upsilon. The versatile varsity swim team member has been active in many intramurals this year.

Papadakis won the Intramural Handball and Paddle Ball singles tourneys this year and was also active in volleyball, tennis singles and doubles and badminton.

"Papadakis has been a versatile intramural athlete all year, participating in many sports and winning two individual titles. He is certainly deserving of the recognition of the Outstanding Intramural Athlete," states the nominating letter.

Steve Smith, Delta Tau Delta, is another three-sport intramural man who stood out in all three.

Churchich Is Leading NU Hitters With .349

Ely Churchich, Husker catcher turned first baseman, is leading the Nebraska baseballers at the plate with a .349 mark.

The Omaha junior was given a shot at first base in the final game of the Kansas series and was impressive both in the field and with the

stick. He handled eleven chances without an error and smacked two home runs as the Huskers won an 11-1 game.

Churchich's fine play leads coach Tony Sharpe to believe that he has found his first sacker not only for the remainder of this season but also for next year.

Ken Ruisinger, senior first baseman, dropped from the squad after being benched in favor of Churchich in the Kansas series. Ruisinger was hitting .325.

Churchich also leads the team in hits with 22, total bases with 39 and is second in the home run race with five.

Home Runs

Phil Barth, sophomore third sacker, leads the team in home runs with six and is second in the RBI column with 17. Barth sprained an ankle in the second game of the doubleheader with Kansas.

Jerry Harris tops the club in RBI's with 20.

Don Purcell, who plays first, third or the outfield when he isn't pitching, leads the Husker mound corps with a 3.72 earned run average. He has one win and one loss.

Jan Wall, another sophomore, is the top winner on the staff with a 4-4 mark and a 4.20 ERA. He leads in strikeouts with 43. Harry Tolly, the only senior on the pitching staff, has posted a 3-3 record and a 4.00 ERA while striking out 41.

Nebraska closes the 1960 season Friday and Saturday at Oklahoma and Wall and Tolly will probably get the mound call from Sharpe for the Friday doubleheader with Purcell likely going in the singleton Saturday.

The Huskers have a 5-9 conference record and are 9-11 on the season.

By Alfred Sheinwold It's sometimes a great comfort to know that everybody at the table was dealt 13 cards. Every one of those cards must appear sooner or later, so you can afford to sit back and wait for them.

South dealer
Both sides vulnerable

West opened the king of hearts, and dummy's ace won. Declarer finessed the ten of spades around to the king, and West tried to cash the queen of hearts.

South ruffed with the jack of spades and led a low trump to dummy's eight. Then he finessed the queen of diamonds to West's king.

This is where West got panicky. He saw the long diamond suit in the dummy and feared that declarer would discard his club losers on the diamonds. With a now-or-never

look on his face, West led out the ace of clubs and continued with another club.

How Counting Helps

Now let's get back to the idea of counting up to 13. When West takes the king of diamonds he knows that South started with only five trumps and one heart. West cannot tell how many diamonds South started with, but he does know that South was dealt 13 cards. Since only six of them were, in spades and hearts, South was surely dealt a total of seven cards in diamonds and clubs.

No matter how South's seven cards in diamonds and clubs are split, after he has finished with five rounds of diamonds he is sure to have two clubs left in his hand. Hence there is no need to worry about the clubs. West can afford to wait.

West should return a diamond after taking his king. South will run the diamonds, getting rid of two clubs, but he will eventually have to lose two club tricks.

Daily Question
Dealer, at your right, bids one heart. You hold: ♠AQJ74 ♥7 ♣A83 ♦K1084. What do you say?

Answer: Bid one spade. If partner raises you can try for game. You are not strong enough to begin with a take-out double and then bid your spades later.
