

Dillard, Thornton Pace Nebraska Grid Offense

Bennie Dillard jumped into the rushing and total offense lead on the Nebraska statistical charts with his performance Saturday.

Dillard, making his first appearance of the season, carried the ball three times for 43 yards, an average of 14.3 yards per play.

Thunder Thornton, sophomore fullback, leads the Husker regulars in rushing and total offense with 189 yards on 42 carries for a 4.5 average.

Three Nebraskans, Ron Meade, Noel Martin and John Faيمان, have minus rushing averages. Meade has lost two net yards on 12 carries.

Martin has lost one net yard on three carries.

Dillard, White, Clare, Dallas Dyer and Warren Powers have not been thrown for a loss this season.

Meade leads the team in pass completion percentage with four completions in seven attempts for a .571 percentage. Fairan is close behind with two completions of four for a .500 mark.

Pat Fischer has completed only three of 13 and has had four aeriels pirated by the opponents.

Fischer continues to lead the Nebraska scorers with 18 points on three touchdowns.

Clay White is the leading pass receiver with two catches for 36 yards. Thornton is the only player to receive more than one pass.

Archie Cobb continues to punt the ball at a 40-yard clip with 23 punts for 924 yards and a 40.2 average.

Nebraska trails the first four opponents in first downs, 35-32, in rushing, 674-631 yards, and in passing yardage, 179-96.

Freshman Wrestling Roster Includes 13 State Champions

varsity squad for the years to come.

Coach Mickey Sparano sees the freshman squad as a "foundation for a good sound wrestling team in the future."

Leading the list of state champions are past students of Sparano. Jim Fuxa, Bob Swanberg, Bob Van Outry, and Bill Gorgen were all members of Sparano's 1959 State Championship wrestling team.

Fuxa, Swanberg, and Van Outry have a combined win-loss record of 25-0 and won State, City and Omaha North High School Invitational titles in 1960.

Besides being outstanding wrestlers, most of these wrestlers are top scholars. "A wrestler besides having to stay in school has to think while on the mat, and these boys are good wrestlers because they are scholars," said Coach Sparano.

Judo Can Become Object Lesson in Human Nature

By Joe Johnson. Judo is what you might call an object lesson in human nature.

This sport is a lot more than a study of physical techniques or tricks. It's sort of a course in psychology. Building up the mind to a point at which one can conquer anything is probably the most important part of judo.

After all, you have to think BIG if you're a 95-pound weakling meeting a 300-pounder in a couple of fast rounds of judo.

Of course it's all in the way you look at it. This is the part of the Nebraska Judo Club, organized in 1954. In one semester the club takes beginning students through these basic points: balance, blocking and throwing — in that order.

Sachio Ashida, one of the few holders of the 5th degree black belt in the United States and instructor in the club, points out, "Without knowing ourselves, we can't possibly understand others."

So, the byword in judo is "know yourself." It deals to a great extent with the psychology, as well as physiology. You could probably say that it comes right down to

out-guessing — at least trying to out-guess. But this again is just in the way you look at it.

Judo is the "Great Equalizer," the "Thinking man's sport." It is fairer to size than any other sport and it takes a bit of planning to interpret an opponent's moves.

This is strictly a competitive sport. That's all. But Ashida is quick to point out the differences between judo and karate.

Karate, a Japanese form which vastly outdates 85-year-old judo, is a sport made famous in the United States by its ads in the jock-magazine of "Learn to Kill." This is a tad more deadly.

When you watch judo competition you can see that this sport really is an art. The movements are expert and actually graceful.

At Nebraska, Ashida instructs about 25 students each Tuesday and Thursday evening in the Coliseum. The club introduces the 26 primary techniques of the sport. From there, the format breaks into continued practice, always stressing the "know yourself" part of it. And after all, you ought to know somebody.
