After four weeks of bowling in the Big Eight League, Nebrasks stands in second place.







TINY MEMORY UNIT **GUIDES GIANT ROCKETS** INTO SPACE

On this tiny drum, only four and one half inches in diameter, is recorded all the significant data needed to direct a rocket
