# Society to Construct Civil War Exhibition

Nebraska's role in the Civil War effort will be portrayed in a special centennial exhibition to be completed by the State Historical Society in June.

Museum director, Marvin F. Kivett, explained that many Nebraskans feel their state did little to contribute to the war effort, but that in reality, Nebraska contributed the second highest percentage of troops in the territories.

Nebraskan participation in the Battle of Shiloh at Pitts Robert Furnas and John Thayburgh Landing and the Battle of White Stone Hill in North Dakota will be two of the events depicted in the exhibit, Kivett noted.

"We will attempt to show how Nebraskans lived and how they felt about the war during this period.
"Much of Nebraska, for in-
