

Jennings Continues to Stress Offense in Spring Workouts

Nebraska football coach Bill Jennings continued to stress offense as the Huskers entered the second week of Spring drills Monday.
The Huskers concentrated on offense all last week with the major emphasis on passing and Jennings indicated they would turn to the running game the first part of this week.
"We have been working mainly on developing our passing thus far and we will now incorporate our running game with our passing game to give attention to our entire offensive setup," Jennings said.
Jennings indicated that a scrimmage may be held this afternoon, but the decision

was not definite yet Monday. If no scrimmage is held, the Huskers will begin working on defense today. If a scrimmage is held, then Jennings said defensive work would begin Wednesday.
The Nebraska gridders are working today to make up for Saturday's cancelled session. They will also work Wednesday, Friday and Saturday with a scrimmage slated for Saturday if the weather is good. Last Saturday's scrimmage was cancelled because Jennings planned to concentrate on passing during the scrimmage and the coaches decided the 22-mile an hour wind was not conducive to passing.
Several position changes were noted in Monday's

workout with the major ones being:
George Haney, a letterman at left tackle from the number two left tackle slot to the number two center post. This moved sophomore stand-out Ed Mitchell, a 245-pounder, from number three to number two at left tackle.
Tyrone Robertson, a junior letterman was moved from number two left guard to number two right guard.
Backfield changes found Ron Meade moving ahead of John Falman as number one quarterback, Thunder Thornton replacing Pat Clare as number one left halfback and Dennis Stuewe moving from number two right halfback to the number one unit replacing Warren Powers.
Gene Ward moved from a number three halfback post

to number two fullback. This move puts two newcomers at the top two fullback slots. Bill Cornstock, a converted end is running with the top unit.
Half-A-Line
Jennings concluded Monday's practice with a 30-minute offensive scrimmage. He sent his charges through 45 minutes of individual and group position work, plus half-a-line offensive drills.
Half-a-line drills consist of a full backfield running behind one side of the line while another full backfield runs behind the other half of the line.
"The main purpose of this drill is to check on how well the players are carrying out their blocking and ball-handling assignments," Jennings said.

responsibility to teach, practice, and uphold the principles of Judo.
Judo is known as an art of combat, but the real value of judo as applied to everyday life is in the principles and nature of its training. The training is in the form of competitive sport, designed to develop and cultivate the skill and powers inherent in man.
A man in judo trains to develop poise, confidence, restraint, and gentleness, together with coordination and agility.
A contest in judo is not an end, but a part and means of training as well as a test of skill. It is called Shiai or trial match. A match usually lasts five minutes or until a point is scored. A point is awarded for a clean throw or an effective choke or a hold for 30 seconds. If there is no deciding point scored the referee may award a decision.

NU Looking for 1st Big 8 Win After Battling Top Two Teams

Two winless teams in Big Eight baseball play will meet Friday and Saturday on the Husker diamond when Iowa State invades Nebraska.
Nebraska is in the conference cellar with an 0-5 mark and Iowa State is seventh with an 0-2 record. The Nebraska record may not be indicative of the Husker potential since the first two series

played by Coach Tony Sharpe's club have been against perennial powerhouses Oklahoma State and Missouri.
Both the Tigers and Cowboys are ranked among the top 15 college teams in the nation by the baseball coaches. Oklahoma State is leading the Big Eight standings with a 5-0 mark and Missouri is involved in a four-way tie for second with Kansas, Colorado and Oklahoma. The Tigers have a 1-1 record in the conference.
Sharpe said he was generally pleased with the Huskers' performance against Missouri despite the fact that the Tigers swept the three-game series.
"I don't know how pleased you can be when you lose all three games, but I thought our boys came through real good," Sharpe said.

and then meet the two top teams in the Big Eight, it would have been real easy for the boys to fold, but they came back and gave it all they had against Missouri," the Husker coach continued.
Sharpe picked out sophomore pitchers Ron Havekost, Tom Ernst and Ernie Bonistall for special mention. Havekost held the Tigers to only two runs for seven innings before the roof fell in and Missouri scored three in the eighth to take a 5-3 win.
Bonistall gave up only one earned run and four hits in the opener of Saturday's twin-bill, but Missouri pulled out a 2-1 decision with a run in the last of the seventh inning in the seven-inning game.
Ernst came on in relief of Jan Wall in the nightcap and pitched 1 1/2 innings, allowing only one hit and no runs as the Huskers dropped a 5-2 decision.
"As the players begin to get a little more experience, they will begin to hit with men on base," Sharpe said. "We out-hit Missouri, 21-19, but they (the Tigers) got them when they counted."
