## Two Iranian Farmers View State Agriculture

Two young adult farmers from Iran will spend two months in Nebraska this summer living and working with farm families as International Farm Youth Exchanges.

Taghan Mohammed Shamsi of Baghban, Iran, and Ex-mil Farshad of Magazine Shahmarden, Iran, arrived in Nebraska Monday and will spend their first three weeks in Nuckolls County under the supervision of the county agents there.

Shamsi will live, work and observe the farming operations on the Alfred Christensen farm and Farshad will have the opportunity to work with the Harold Putman family near Nelson, according to John Orr, associate state 4-H and Young Men and Women leader at the University.

From Nuckolls County the

young men will have an opportunity to attend the Western Regional Rural Youth Conference in Madison, South Dakota, and the Nebraska 4-H Club week activities in Lincoln.

The two Iranians will then visit families and farms in Pierce, Antelope, Wayne and Knox counties.

Farshad, 29, is interested in learning more about the poultry industry, gardening and agricultural Extension methods. He likes sports and physical activity.

Shamsi, 25, is also interested in poultry, gardening and Extension methods.

Both are members of the Islam faith and have finished secondary school. Their native language is Persian but they understand English if spoken slowly, according to Orr.
