

New Faces Present on NU 1st Team

Coach Bill Jennings announced several position changes in the Husker lineup Tuesday and his gridgers staged something new yesterday—a night practice.

The 7 p.m. workout under the practice field lights was necessary because several squad members took tests yesterday afternoon and could not practice.

Several Huskers have moved up to the Red team, the starting NU eleven, according to Jennings. Don Purcell, Dallas Dyer, Ed Mitchell and Rudy Johnson will all start for the Huskers against Kansas State Saturday.

Purcell, senior tri-captain, will alternate with Jim Hoge at left end. Purcell is considered one of the top defensive ends in the Big Eight and Hoge has made some bril-

liant pass catches in two games for the Huskers this fall.

Dyer Versatile

Dyer, 188-pound senior from Lexington, was moved into the number one left guard spot,

replacing Dwain Carlson, who has been shifted to right guard.

Jennings has special praise for Dyer saying, "He plays to the best of his ability at any position." The two-year letterman has played every position on the squad except tackle.

The move was necessitated when tackle Al Fischer was injured in Monday night's practice. Fischer sprained his knee and will not play Saturday, Jennings reported.

Robertson Switched

Tyrone Robertson was switched from right guard to right tackle to replace the injured Fischer behind Bob Brown.

Corwin Bishop was shifted from right to left guard and is listed on the third string, behind Dyer and John Kirby.

Ed Mitchell moved up to the starting right guard spot in the absence of Robertson. Fullback Rudy Johnson, who

started against Arizona, is also listed with the first unit.

Stuwe Will Start

In other changes Jennings listed Willie Ross as the number one right halfback with Pat Clare at number two. Dennis Stuwe, who turned in a fine performance against Arizona, however, will probably be the Husker starting right half Saturday.

Stuwe has been out this week with a sprained ankle but should be ready to go for the Wildcat game.

In another move, Jennings announced that Ron Meade, senior quarterback and place-kicker, has moved up to the number two unit, replacing John Faimon.

Starters

The starting Husker team is now Purcell and Larry Tomlinson at the ends, Bob Jones and Brown at tackles, Dyer and Mitchell at guards, Mick Tingelhoff, center, Dennis Claridge, quarterback, Bill Thornton, left half, Ross (or Stuwe) right half and Johnson at fullback.

Nebraska and Kansas State,

both undefeated, will meet in the first conference test for both teams.

K-State Improved

Jennings has termed the K-Staters "opportunists." "They're 50 per cent better than last year — they have better depth," he commented.

"Kansas State won't overpower an opponent," Husker Scout Dick Monroe said, "but the players are quick and are able to come up with the big play both offensively and defensively."

Kansas State, which has downed Nebraska in five of the last eight meetings, has been the surprise team of the Big Eight so far this fall. The Wildcats, underdogs in both

games, have surprised Indiana 14-8 and Air Force 14-12.

Pass Beats Falcons
A 21-yard pass late in the game from sophomore quarterback Larry Corrigan to Spencer Puls, 155-pound half-back from Holdrege, set up the winning touchdown against Air Force.

The 'Cats were on the short end of the statistics in the game against the Falcons at Denver but Phil Barger's two conversions provided the victory margin.

Corrigan, a poised 180-pounder has paced both K-State wins with his aerial strikes. He has completed seven of 15 passes for 126 yards. Possibly even more important, Corrigan has had no passes intercepted.

Wildcats Small
The Wildcats are ranked as one of the nation's smallest major college teams, averaging just 180 pounds per man among the starters and showing only a 166-pound average in the backfield.

The Huskers will have a definite weight advantage but could go into the game as underdogs.

The game could shape up sophomore quarterbacks Corrigan and NU's Claridge. Claridge completed six of 11 tosses to keep NU in the game against Arizona.

The Huskers will make the trip to Manhattan by bus, leaving Lincoln at 11:30 a.m. and arriving at 3 p.m. The team will stay at the Wareham Hotel.

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
