

Shots Plentiful; Bull's-eyes Not

There were plenty of shots in the NU Coliseum Saturday night but not enough of them on target to suit the wishes of the 9,000 plus fans who watched Colorado shave Nebraska 58-56 in a basketball thriller.

The shots came from the close contest between the leaders of the Big Eight Conference and also from the rifles of a crack drill team from Salina, Kan., which appeared at halftime and gave a resounding performance.

The Huskers battled once again right down to the wire, but some bad NU passes, tough breaks and a late cold spell from the free throw line spelled defeat for Nebraska. The loss was NU's first conference setback against two wins and eighth loss of the year. The Huskers have won six.

The victory enabled Colorado to take sole possession of the Big Eight cage lead with a 2-0 loop mark and become the only undefeated team in conference play.

The Huskers held the Buffs even in every category except free throw shooting where Colorado made two more than NU, the difference in the game.

The game was a seesaw affair until Colorado forged ahead for the third time in the game on two free tosses by Milt Mueller at 47-45 with a little over eight minutes left in the game.

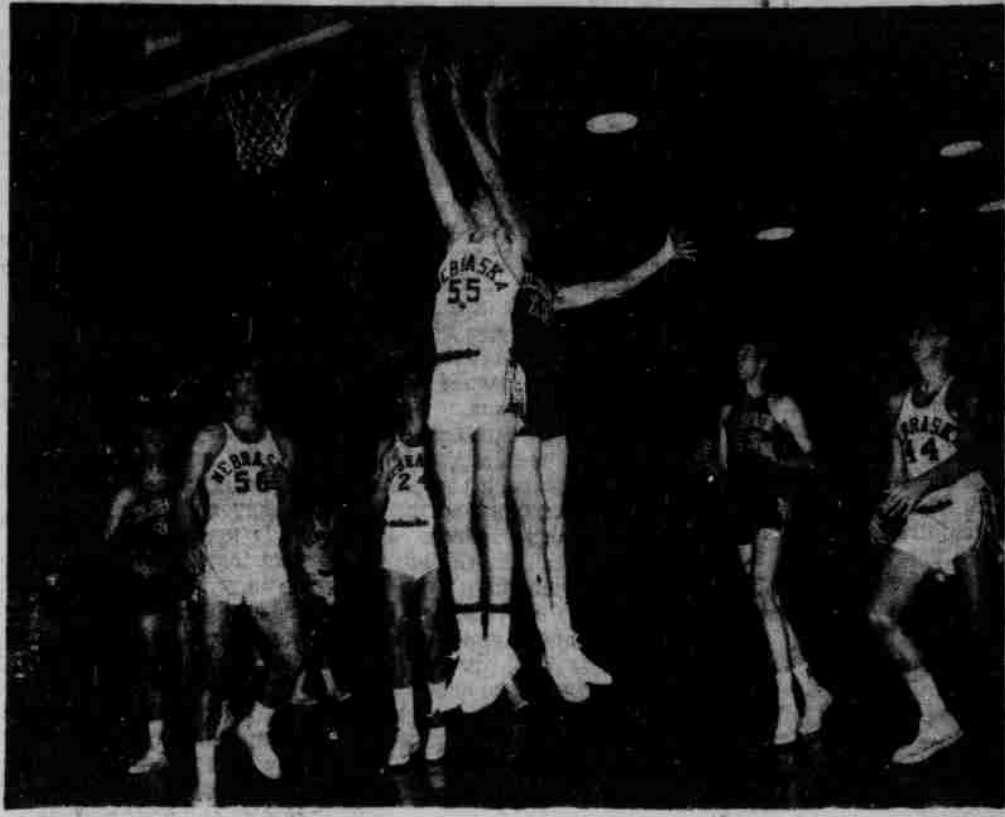
The two teams traded buckets until NU soph Daryl Petsch hit a long set shot to close the gap to 53-52 with 5:50 remaining.

Both defenses stiffened and costly passes prevented Nebraska from going ahead. NU got a tough break when, with over five minutes left, Chuck Sladovnik stole the ball and headed down court on the fast break. His layup looked good but was touched by a CU player and fell away. NU Coach Jerry Bush unsuccessfully protested that there was foul tending on the play.

After over three minutes of swish silence, Colorado's Wilky Gilmore sneaked in for a layin with 2:05 left to push CU out in front 55-52.

On the play which Gilmore scored, NU's veteran forward Tommy Russell suffered an arm injury which sidelined him for the rest of the game.

Two for four free throws by NU's Ivan Grupe on one-and-one situations and one by CU center, 6-8 Jim Davis, nar-

rowed the count to 56-45 with 1:18 left.

Then, with a little more than a minute left, Sladovnik stole the ball again but was fouled by Davis and Sladovnik fell to the floor with the wind temporarily knocked out of him.

Bush sent Bill Vincent, who thrilled the fans in the first half with a sensational 25-foot hook and another long poke, to shoot for Sladovnik at the line. Vincent missed and Colorado took control of the ball and the game.

Grupe fouled Buff Ken Charlton and Charlton, CU's leading point-maker with 16, hit his two free throws to ice the game giving the Buffaloes a four point streak before Neil Nannen's basket at the gun.

Nebraska broke out in front fast. The Huskers led by scores of 6-0, 9-2, 11-4 and 17-12 before CU knotted the score at 23-all. Colorado led 30-28 at the half.

Leading the early Husker spree was Petsch. The 6-5 sophomore had another fine night, hitting 20 points on nine field goals, most of them long sets or jumpers.

Russell hit 11 points but the rest of the Husker starters failed to produce much, and Charley Jones also dented the Husker scoring column.

Sidelights — Trainer Paul

Schneider reported after the game that both Russell and Sladovnik, who were forced to the sidelines, should be ready for Saturday's game at Iowa State.

Bush rated Colorado as the toughest team in the league and explained that NU had sluffed one man off to help guard the Buffs' high-scoring Charlton. The NU coach thought his boys "all hustled."

Swimmers Split in Iowa

The Nebraska swim team split over the weekend, winning Friday's dual at Grinnell, but falling to Iowa State Saturday at Ames.

In the Grinnell meet three Huskers set new meet records. They were 1:45.6 in the 160-yard individual medley by Phil Swaim, 2:17.5 in the 200-yard butterfly set by Bill Fowles, and 2:31.0 in the 200-yard breaststroke set by La Verne Bauers.

Bauers' win in the 200-yard breaststroke provided the margin for the Nebraskans' 48-46 victory.

In the IS dual two records were set. Cyclone Bill Muter won the 200-yard butterfly in 2:18.5, and led Iowa's 400-yard medley relay team to a 3:59.5 record.

Huskers Bill Henry and Kuni Mihara provided wins in the 200-yard backstroke and 440-yard freestyle, but Iowa State took the meet 64-30.

Wrestlers Sweep Two Road Meets

Mike Nissen, Dave Cook and Harold Thompson kept on their winning ways to bolster the Nebraska matmen's successful weekend road tour in Colorado. Heavyweight Jim Raschke was pressed for the first time this season at Boulder.

Falls by Thompson and Raschke provided the margin in the slim 16-12 win over Colorado Mines at Golden Saturday night.

At Boulder, Friday, the Huskers won five of the first six bouts and then held off the Buffs for a 19-16 victory.

Raschke, Coach Bob Mancuso's undefeated heavyweight from Omaha, ran in trouble Friday and only managed a 4-4 draw with Bill Frank. Raschke flattened Mines' Duane Schroeder in 6:47.

Nissen racked up two convincing decisions in the 123-pound class and Cook followed in the same style at 1:47.

Thompson downed Colorado's Stan Phillips, 18 to 6 and scored a 5-18 fall at Golden. John Karr's win by forfeit at 115 and Jim Faimon's victory at 137 helped against the Buffaloes.

Mancuso's wrestlers are now 4-0-1 for the season.

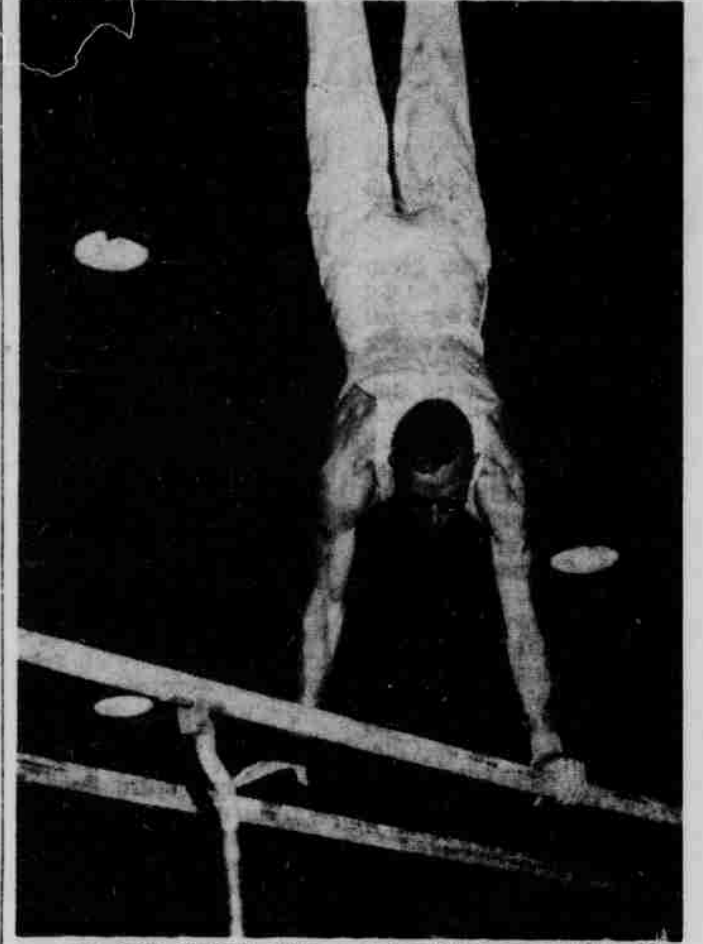
