All-University Squad Selected

Navy ROTC, the 1962 intramural basketball champions placed two men on the Daily Nebraskan's All-University cage team, with Mike Stacey at forward and Dean Prazak at guard.

Bob Prokop, from runner-up Kappa Sigma in fraternity competition, holds a newly created position on the team as player-coach.

The mythical team is completed with Lambert Sobon of Sigma Phi Epsilon's Fraternity-A champs at forward, Monte Kiffin of Burr-Selleck champs, Canfield, at center; and Al Olsen of Bessey at guard.

This year's team, with Prokop at the helm, holds some of the greatest basketball talent in recent intramural basketball competition.

Prokop

The near unanimous choice Prokop has established an unprecedented record in intramural basketball competition. The 6-2, 240-pound center has made all-Fraternity recognition for 7 years running. From this fact, Prokop derives his title the "Old Pro".

During this period the Wilbur high school graduate has played and coached 108 games, winning 101 and losing only seven. "Pro" averaged 16 points per game this season. The graduate student in Chemistry plans to attend Medical School next year.

Olsen

The other high vote gainer in this year's selections is Olsen of Bessey. Olsen, in his second year as an All-Dorm choice, cracked the All-University selections with

a 23 point-per-game average. The 6-2 standout from Babylon High, Long Island, New York, was named Most Valuable Player three years running in varsity basketball and added two baseball letters in high school.

The dorm point leader is a junior majoring in business administration, a member of Wesley Foundation, and a dorm counselor at Selleck.

Stacey

Aggressive playmaker are the words that mark Stacey as a repeater on the All-University squad and a member of Navy ROTC's intramural leaders.

The 6-3, 175-pound standout forward, attended Weeping Water High School where he was an All-Stater in basketball his senior year. He also earned All-Conference ratings in basketball and football.

Stacey was a member of the Husker freshman basketball team and received unanimous choice to the Daily Nebraskan's all-independent team. He is a member of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity.

Prazak

The shortest man on the mythical five and another Navy ROTC standout is Prazak, a guard on the All-University selections. The 5-10 repeater off last year's team was marked as a tough defensive man throughout the year and maintained a ten point per game average.

The mechanical engineer-

ing senior hails from Clarkson High School where he was a basketball and track standout. Prazak participated in varsity basketball and intramural football, handball, paddleball, and volleyball.

Kiffin

Kiffin captured the center position on this year's selections with his consistent scoring and rebounding in Burr-Selleck competition. Kiffin led his Canfield team to the Dorm championship and to the semi-finals of the All-University tourney.

Kiffin was a member of last year's Husker football team at the position of tackle.

An all-sports standout in Lexington High School Kiffin gained 'Athlete of the Year' recognition in his senior year and was a member of Lexington's state championship team of 1957.

Sobon

Sobon at forward rounds out this year's selections. The 6-3 intramural standout is the fraternities gift to the team and played for the fraternity champs, Sigma Phi Epsilon.

Sobon was considered one of the best big men in the Greek league and ended the season with a 20 point average.

Sobon is another mechanical engineering senior and cracked the all-university football line-up last fall. He is the holder of the intramural track shot put record.

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Nebraska Gym Team Wins All-College Title

The Husker gymnasts triumphed over favorites Denver University, Mankato State and the Air Force Academy to win the All-College Championship at Boulder over the weekend.

Twelve schools fell to the Nebraskans in the annual affair. In the 17 years that Coach Jake Geier has been taking the Huskers to this meet, the Scarlet and Cream have never placed lower than third. Nebraska has won the

All-College Championship seven times.

Victory over the top-seeded teams was sweet for NU because both Mankato and Denver University had defeated the Huskers earlier this year on road trips.

Nebraska also gained the individual all-around competition crown with sophomore Dennis Albers snatching a

narrow victory over John Quintana of Denver University. Albers racked up 48.25 points to Quintana's 47.35.

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Victory Shower For Geier After Huskers Win Trophy

Husker gymnasts, plagued by injuries, came from behind to snatch victory from Denver University.

"Denver University was ahead of us on Friday," said Coach Jake Geier discussing the All-College gymnastics meet. "We knew we'd pick up some points on them, but the announcer didn't give a running score so we didn't know how many."

"Then, recalls Geier, "they said we were the winner, and the guys gave me the best shower I've had in a long while. That water sure was cold."

Dennis Albers was injured in the Friday preliminaries on the high bar. At that time Geier figured Denver had the Nebraskans beaten by four points, but Albers bounced back to take two firsts.

Denver claimed 20 positions in Saturday's final, the Air Force Academy 21, and Nebraska 19. But when the time came for those 60 routines to be performed Geier said, "They fell apart—we held together long enough to win our first All-College Championship since 1958. It was a doubly sweet victory after having lost to Denver and Mankato."

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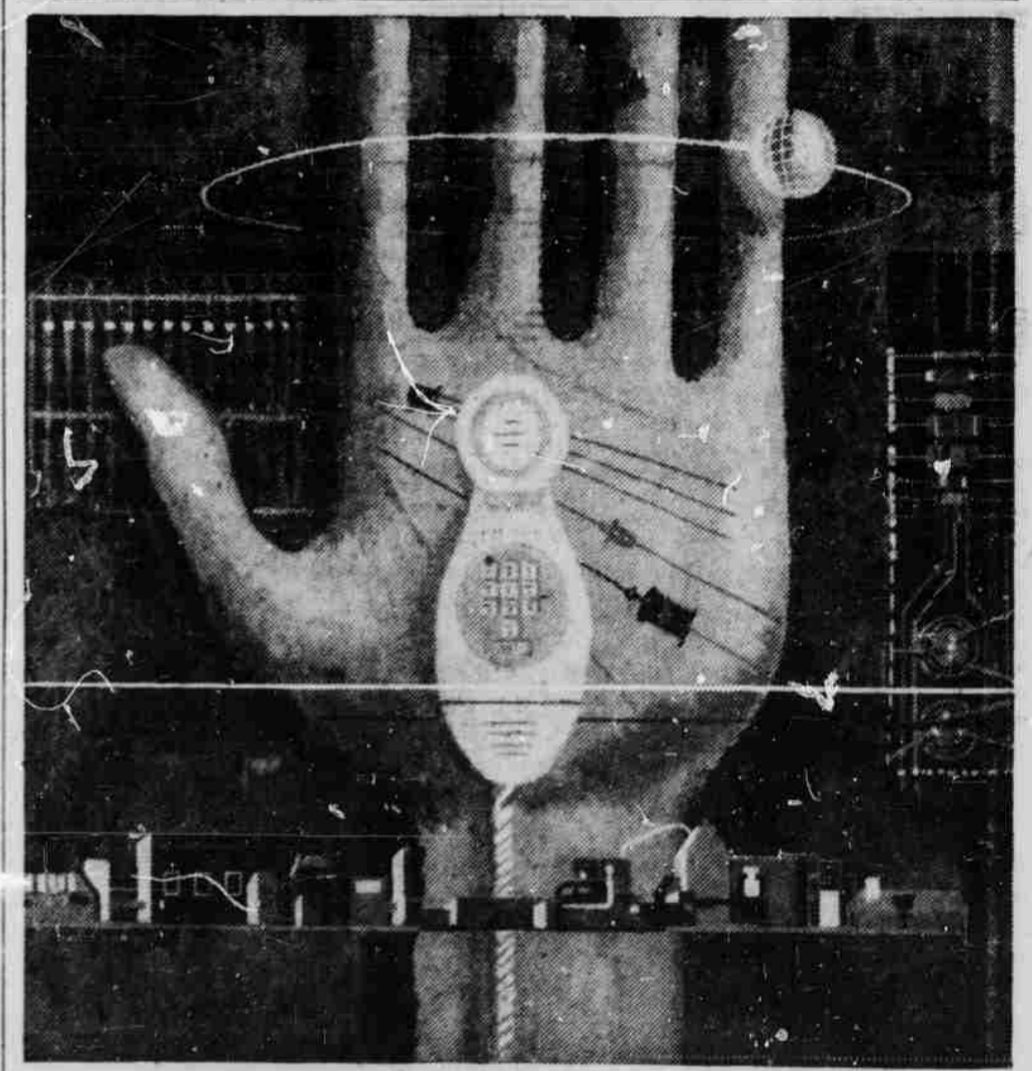
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
