At the same time candidates are given an opportunity to express their views. Today's article treats candidates for representatives from the Colleges of Engineering and Architecture, and Arts and Sciences. No forms have been received from Christine Rehm, Karen Benting and Peggy Sten-ten in Arts and Sciences.

Engineering, Architecture

Hansen

James Hansen, sophomore, thinks that the Student Council, "should act as both a mirror and a mold of student opinion." According to Hansen, another function of the Council is to serve as a link between the student body and the University faculty. Hansen's platform stresses

an increased budget. He would also like to see the renewal of the Husker Roundtable where the Chancellor meets with the Council members. He favors a system "whereby past committee chairmen would hold over for a short time in the fall to get new committee chairmen started out on the right foot."

Hansen is a member of Kosmet Klub, Delta Tau Delta, and Spring Day trophy chairman.

Marshall
Rodney Marshall, sophomore, feels that the "Student Council should be a device to express student opinion of campus." He thinks that, "The Student Council should be a coordination of student and organizational activities, and should be a liaison between the University Administration and the subject."

Marshall is in favor of a review of the women's hours, the improvement of parking lots, and a partial living unit representation plan for the Student Council. Marshall stated that he would "generally be opposed to the affiliation of the University with NSA."

Marshall is president of Benton House, secretary of Phi Eta Sigma freshman honorary, and serves on the RAM Council.

Redman
Dale Redman, freshman believes that the Student Council "should be the leading group in guiding the direction of and developing the continuity of the University program." He feels that the "Student Council should concern itself with issues — campus, state, national and international, pertinent to the best interests of the student body."

Redman, in stating his platform, said, "the Council must remove the stigma of 'mopism' and work to achieve the status of most influential, active and respected organization on campus."

Redman serves as the chairman of the Union special events committee and is on the Student Council representation study committee.

Seidell
Robert Seidell, sophomore, feels the role of the Student

Council should be "a broadening one: one which wouldn't concern itself strictly with campus issues, but would expand to issues of state, national and international concern."

Seidell's goals, if elected, are, "better communication between the Council and the student body." He is in favor of, "an increased budget for the Council which would help it operate more efficiently, and explore new fields which it was not previously able to be active in." He also feels the public issues committee should, "expand into civil defense, youth exodus from the state, Peace Corps, and wage minimum on the campus."

Seidell is an IFC representative, and serves on the Student Council associate committee. He is past chairman of the Greek Games in 1961, a member of Sigma Chi and active in intramural sports.

Miss Volberding
Mary Ann Volberding, sophomore, feels that "the Student Council should represent the students as much as possible by adding the administration in making policies which directly concern the student body."

Miss Volberding's platform contains a better parking system, a system controlled by students to fight the cheating on the campus and the improvement of public relations by the use of reports such as news posters. She also feels that Council representatives should hold meetings with the members of the college they are representing in order to give information of Council activities and draw opinions from the students.

Miss Volberding is a member of Tassels, Kappa Delta, and is office manager of the Nebraska Blueprint.

Arts and Sciences

Miss Armstrong
Suzanne Armstrong, freshman, feels the Student Council, "should play a strong role in University affairs since it is the organization which can most effectively voice the opinion of the college student."

Miss Armstrong is interested in, "developing the Student Council associates to a more effective program, as it is an excellent means to develop potential Council members."

She is a member of Student Council associates, Delta Delta Delta and is the assistant chairman of the Union public relations committee.

Miss Birney
Judy Birney, sophomore, thinks the role of the Student Council should be, "to strengthen the ties between the Student Council and the student body, to recognize and emphasize student leadership in other areas of campus life and to publicize Student Council activities more on campus."

Miss Birney would like to see a Junior Student Council set up next year. It would be an exact replica of the Student Council with the exception of rotating committees. Committee members would be rotated once a month to give them a working knowledge of the committees' work. Miss Birney is in favor of representation of the Lincoln students, and in a

more definite pattern of parliamentary procedure.

Miss Birney is a member of Tassels, Alpha Phi and a Cadence Countess.

Christie
Dennis Christie, sophomore, feels that the role of Student Council is threefold, "the presentation of student opinion, the calendaring student activities and cultural programming."

Christie's platform for next year includes a thorough study of Council representation, a revision in the committee system, an increased budget and opposition to NSA affiliation.

Christie is past president of Junior IFC, a member of the IFC affairs committee, scholarship chairman of IFC affairs committee, member of Phi Delta Theta, publicity chairman of Phi Eta Sigma freshman honorary, and members of Nu-Meds.

Kittams

David Kittams, freshman, sees the role of the Student Council "as a body small enough to perform several functions denied, for the most part, to the student body." He feels that, "the Council should be a body of convenient size, of interested, as well as representative, membership, and of an aggressive philosophy in determining and pursuing a consistent policy."

Kittams listed programs in need of study as the representation problem, certain organizational policies, and a review of AWS late hours.

Kittams is a member of Nu-Meds, Daily Nebraskan worker and chairman of RAM publishing committee.

Kotouc

Tom Kotouc, sophomore, favors Council leadership in establishing a Senator-to-Senator program which "will provide state senators with an opportunity to become an integral part of campus life."

Kotouc noted that "students will take an interest in Student Council to the extent that it serves them." In consequence, he proposed that the Council undertake open studies and discussions on is-

ssues as "living unit, campus political parties, student cheating, the University budget, opportunities for youth in Nebraska, federal aid to education and the state tax structure."

Advocating aggressive and conscientious leadership for Student Council next year, Kotouc is chairman of the Nebraska Council of Youth, member of Phi Kappa Psi, president of Phi Eta Sigma, Daily Nebraskan staff writer and a member of Corn Cobs.

Miss Olson

Jeri Ann Olson, freshman, said "the Student Council should be a student governing body which is concerned with the betterment of the University." She feels that the Council should reflect a representative opinion and coordinate similar ideas into opinions.

In her platform, Miss Olson, states a desire to see NSA given a trial period. She is also in favor of changing the method of representation to possibly a system of living districts. She has suggested that the English Department assign in-class themes on issues concerning the Student Council. The papers, after being graded, would be sent to the Council for study.

Miss Olson is a member of Nu-Meds, Tassels, Sigma Kappa and Student Council associates. She is a Spring Day and Union worker and plays in the orchestra.

Rogowski

Ron Rogowski, sophomore, stated that the "Student Council should be a true representative of student opinion." This he feels should also be carried on at the local, state and national levels, when the issues concern the students at the University.

Rogowski's ideas for next year are the removal of voting power for organizational representatives, and a study of Council presentation. He also feels that there should be a healthy, intelligent, two-party system on the campus.

Rogowski is a member of the Wesley House chair, and

works on the RAM News-gram.

Miss Wahl
Ann Wahl, a sophomore, feels the Student Council "should act as the supreme governing body for students; it should regulate and coordinate the various phases of student government."

Her platform for next year includes improvement of the associate program, improved representation through public reports on the attendance and participation of Council members and Council activities, and the coordination of the control exercised by the Council and University regulations as applied to certain organizations on the campus.

Miss Wahl is a Red Cross assistant, a Builders worker, a member of Student Council associates and Alpha Omicron pi. She serves on People-to-People and is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta freshman honorary.

Wright

Thomas Wright, sophomore, said the role of the Student Council should be "to represent the student body to the faculty and to the Administration to serve as a reflection of the student body to both the Administration and the people not included in the University community and to stimulate and inform the student body."

Wright's platform for next year includes an increased budget, a change in Student

Council representation, a worthwhile Student Council associates program, an active public relations program and a closer relationship between Faculty Senate and Student Council.

Wright is a member of Sigma Chi, a Student Council associate and Kosmet Klub.

Growth of Brazil To Be Discussed

Prof. Bernard Rosen, of the department of sociology, will address members of the Spanish Club and other interested persons at the Student Union tomorrow at 8 p.m.

He will speak on "Personality and Economic Growth in Brazil." After the conference there will be a brief question and answer period.
