

Sevigne Foresees 'Real Close' Meet

Huskies to Dual Buff Cindermen

"Real close," is the way Husker track coach Frank Sevigne sees the meet with Colorado at 2 p.m. Saturday in Memorial Stadium.
The Nebraska - Colorado dual, always a top-notch battle, could go down to the 440 and mile relays. "We're hoping all our performances will be outstanding," Sevigne said.
In a triangular with the Air Force Academy and Colorado earlier this year the Huskers nipped the Buffs by a narrow two points, 73 1/2-71 1/2.

The broad jump could be in the limelight if Husker Victor Brooks is up to par. He will meet the NCAA jumping champion in Buff Don Meyers. Meyers is also strong in the pole vault with a mark of 15-0 and in the high jump with a leap of 6-4.
Both hurdle events will be a stronghold for the Nebraskans. The quartet of Fred Wilke, Ron Moore, Bill Fasano and LeRoy Keane could sweep both the highs and lows.

Sevigne's boys should also shine in the mile and two-mile events with Ray "Skip" Stevens and Mike Fleming, two of the best distance men in the Conference.

Husker Ray Knaub, spring champ in the Kansas and Texas Relays, will be out to earn a victory in the 100 and 200-yard dashes. He will be supported by teammates Steve Pfister and Don Degnan in an effort to nose out Colorado's Olympian Teddy Woods.

Baseballers Meet Pokes

Nebraska's baseball team left yesterday for a crucial three-game series with Oklahoma State at Stillwater.
A doubleheader is slated for today with a nine-inning single game on tap for tomorrow.
This series is crucial to Nebraska if it wants to climb to the first division. The Huskers are now in sixth place, one-half game behind fifth-place Colorado and 1 1/2 games behind fourth-place Oklahoma.

Oklahoma State must also come through in this series if it is to maintain its bid for the title. The defending champion Cowboys are now in third place, trailing Kansas and Missouri by 1 1/2 games.

Huskies Ron Havekost and Ernie Bonistall will take the mound in today's doubleheader. Lefty Havekost has been used more than any Husker moundman, appearing in 36 1-3 innings in compiling a 2-3 record and 2.79 ERA.
Bonistall is the winningest Husker with a 3-2 record. Bonistall, used mostly in relief, has a 2.84 ERA.

Sophomore George Landgren will start the Saturday single game. Landgren pitched well against Concordia of Minnesota and Missouri to earn a starting berth.

Husker football mentor Bob Devaney is not the only loop coach with linemen headaches.

As most of the Big Eight clubs wound up spring drills, many of the conference coaches expressed concern with their line situation.

Some of the comments:
COLORADO
Coach Bud Davis says . . .

Coach Harry Good's golf team will meet Kansas, Kansas State and Wichita in a quadrangular at Lawrence today.

The Huskers, who have a 5-4 dual meet record, will meet the same three teams at Manhattan Saturday.

"We've gotten a pretty good line on our offensive attack. The next important thing is to assemble a good defensive unit."
The Colorado club is making satisfactory progress in its switch from last year's wing-T offense to the pro-type "swingin' T" which the new head Buff man plans to use next fall. There are eight lettermen on the first string.

KANSAS
Head Coach Jack Mitchell had words of praise for fullback Ken Coleman . . . "Coleman is bigger (210) and stronger than last fall (when he aggregated 656 net yards and never was caught for a loss)."

The fullback spot is considered the strongest position in Kansas' backfield.

KANSAS STATE
Here's what Coach Doug Weaver says . . . "I was pleased with spring practice and pleased with the spring game . . . The pass receiving was not as good as I expected it would be."

MISSOURI
What line coach Al Onofrio says . . . "We are firing out real well offensively, but defensively we aren't very far along." Missouri returns just two line regulars. (Spring

OKLAHOMA

Coach Cliff Speegle says . . . "We don't know. Yes, we just don't know how much we have improved." (Drills over tomorrow with scrimmage).

MISSOURI
What line coach Al Onofrio says . . . "We are firing out real well offensively, but defensively we aren't very far along." Missouri returns just two line regulars. (Spring

Throw in some stout, tough male bronc busters and pert, determined rodeo misses and you're set for an action-packed afternoon of rodeo entertainment.

This is the goal of the Nebraska Rodeo Association as it prepares for their fourth annual Intercollegiate Championship Rodeo to be held at the State Fairgrounds Coliseum in Lincoln, May 11-12.

Jim Schooler, head of the hard working corps of student rodeo enthusiasts, has extended an invitation to 20 Nebraska universities and colleges to participate.
